
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BADSEY SUNDAY SCHOOL.

The following balance sheet for the season 1906-7 shows that the Treasurer (Mr. Binyon) has once more succeeded in meeting the club's liabilities. It will be seen that the Reading Room is to all intents and purposes self-supporting, outside help in the shape of hard cash amounting only to the extremely modest sum of 4s. We feel sure, however, there are many in Badsey who do not aspire to membership who would willingly give a small subscription to so excellent an institution. It seems a little hard that nearly the whole of members' subscriptions should be swallowed up in cost of maintenance, scarcely anything being left for games and literature. Leaving out of consideration the billiard-table-and even this is now decidedly the worse for wear-the Reading Room furniture beggars description, yet there is no prospect of improving the existing state of affairs out of members' contributions. Binyon will gratefully acknowledge any gifts of money or furniture which may be sent to him before the end of September, in order that next session may open with a Reading Room equipped in a style more worthy of a parish of the size and importance of Badsey.

WICKHAMFORD CLUB.

This Club (thanks to many friends) has so far proved a phenomenal success, and finished its first session on March 31st with a membership of 41. That the club is really appreciated is shown by the fact that whenever the Parish Room has been open for club purposes there has generally been a good muster of members-indeed some of the more enthusiastic ones would like to have a summer as well as a winter session. The games patronised by the club are cards, dominoes, draughts, and table and wall quoits, whilst the literature provided for the instruction and amusement of members includes such entertaining publications as the "Morning Post," "Birmingham Daily Post," "Daily Mirror," "Daily Mail," "Answers," "Ally Sloper," "Illustrated London News," "Tit Bits," "Lloyd's," and the local weeklies. He was an exceptionally good-natured and kind-hearted fellow, and on the occasion of his funeral the ringers gave a muffled peal.—R.I.P.

The death of Mrs. Stewart, on Wednesday, May 8th, was still more unexpected, for until within a week of its occurrence she was still discharging her duties as nurse, and there can be little doubt that her irrepressible activity hastened her end.
