The Badsey Easter Vestry was held on Tuesday, April 21st. The accounts, presented by Mr. Sladden, showed that the year's receipts for Church Expenses (including £36 6s. 3½d. from collections in church) amounted to £38 11s. 3½d., and the expenditure (including a debit balance of £1 5s. 1d. from preceding year) to £41 17s. 1d., leaving a deficit of £3 5s. 9½d. Messrs. J. Sladden and H. Keen were elected churchwardens, and Messrs. A. Sparrow, C. A. Binyon, E. Knight and Gaukroger were elected sidesmen for the ensuing year.

Mr. Sladden informed the vestry that the lightning conductor had been examined by an expert who recommended a new one. No action was taken.

The Vicar stated that it was proposed to apply for a faculty authorising the sale of the present organ and the erection of a new one, and invited the vestry to discuss the matter. Some of those present said there was a feeling in the parish that it would be a pity to fill up half the vestry with an organ and thus necessitate a reduction of the seating accommodation of the transept in order to provide a choir vestry. After some discussion the Vicar was requested to ask Mr. Whinfield's opinion as to the possibility of erecting an organ without reducing the vestry accommodation, and a committee was appointed to meet Mr. Whinfield and report.

Mr. Gaukroger asked if nothing could be done to improve the appearance of the churchyard, and the churchwardens-elect expressed their willingness to administer any funds that might be entrusted to

them for the purpose.

The Wickhamford Easter Vestry was held on April 22nd. The accounts, presented by Mr. Hooper-Ingledew (Vicar's warden), showed receipts amounting to £10 9s. 10d. and an expenditure of £9 12s. 6d., a credit balance of 17s. 4d. being carried forward.
