

After several years of failing health and a long and tedious final illness borne with singular patience, Mr. Kelland passed to his rest just before the bells called to evensong on Good Friday. Probably few of our readers had any idea of the busy life he had led previous to his retirement to Badsey ten years ago. Holding the position of Veterinary Inspector to the Board of Agriculture and the Norfolk County Council, and that of Veterinary Surgeon for the extensive Norfolk estates of the Duchy of Lancaster, and combining with these offices a very large private practice, it will be understood that Mr. Kelland was a well-known figure in the county where the best years of his life were spent. Mr. Kelland was, however, a man who avoided rather than courted publicity, although he took a deep, if quiet, interest in all public A consistent churchman of the old school, he was a regular church-goer, so long as his health allowed, and a devout communicant. The Badsey Easter Vestry was held in the Parish Room on Tuesday, March 25th, at 8 p.m. The Churchwardens' Accounts, presented by Mr. Sladden, showed receipts amounting to £43 14s. 3d., an expenditure of £44 5s. 8d., and a deficit of 11s. 5d. There were outstanding liabilities of £7 3s. 10d. The accounts were approved.

The Vicar again elected Mr. Sladden to be his Warden and Mr. A. Sparrow was unanimously elected Parishioners' Warden in place of Mr. H. Keen, who had served the office for 19 years in succession. Deep regret was expressed that Mr. Henry Keen was unable, through ill-health, to offer himself for re-election, and a resolution, recording such regret and the vestry's recognition of the valuable services rendered to the Church and parish by both Mr. and Mrs. Keen, was proposed by Mr. W. Mustoe (Mr. Keen's proposer on the occasion of his original election), seconded by Mr. G. E. Jones, and carried unanimously.

Messrs. C. A. Binyon, E. Knight, W. Mustoe, and G. W. Emms were elected sidesmen.

Votes of thanks were passed to the voluntary helpers who took part in the "spring clean," and to Miss E. Sladden for attending to the Church lamps.
