# THE WAR.

Corpl. W. Barnard has been wounded in France and is now in Hospital at Halifax. Pte. H. Gaskin is also reported to have been slightly wounded.

Pte. C. Jeffries writes to his sister from S. Andrew's Hospital, Malta, under date July 21: "Just a line to let you know I am wounded in the neck, shoulder and arm-only flesh wounds. I arrived here vesterday on the ship 'Gloucester Castle' and am in the best of spirits. When we landed there were ladies there with cigarettes, matches, chocolates, biscuits and champagne. Then we were popped in motors and brought here. It was a fine ride through lovely wide streets and this is a lovely place. . . . . I am going to have a look for Crisp when I can get out; S. George's Barracks is not far from here. I expect you received my last card. Well, I had just given that when I got hit. I was having a snipe and put my rifle down to give him the cards. When I got up again and had had a couple more shots a Turk started sniping at me so I let him have another and had just come down to reload when he got me or they did. How I got it in three places I don't know, but I found myself in the bottom of the trench asking someone for a bandage. But it wasn't fair; he had me when I wasn't looking. Anyway I can't grumble, I've had a good spell nearly three months." Pte. Jeffries signs himself "Wounded but Happy."

Pte. C. Crane has had one very narrow escape, his rifle being smashed in his hands by a Turkish bullet.

Pte. G. Crisp left Malta for the Dardanelles on July 26.

Mr. and Mrs. Porter are to be congratulated on the return of their son, Pte. A. Porter, from Germany. He has now gone back to duty at Aldershot.

Pte. W. Addis, writing from France, asks the following question: "How are all the chaps going on now? Are they doing their best for their King and Country or are they walking about and hoping it will all soon be all over?"

## OLD BADSEY WILLS AND INVENTORIES.

The family of Pegyn was located in Badsey and the immediate neighbourhood for several centuries, and many of its members took a prominent part in the affairs of the village, particularly in the 16th Century. The old Churchwardens' Accounts (1525-1600) bear constant witness to the interest displayed by the family in Church affairs, and a Pegyn was often elected as Churchwarden. John Pegyn, senior, was Churchwarden in 1529, or thereabouts, and was succeeded by Robert Pegyn in 1531. This Robert Pegyn also filled the office on two subsequent occasions, and died in 1552. I have quite recently found his will and the inventory of his possessions in the Probate Registry, Worcester. It will be noted that the inventory was made apparently before the testator's death. It is dated 16 August, 1552, and the will is dated 20 August, 1552.

The possessions of this 16th Century Badsey farmer amounted in modern value to some £656. They were appraised as follows:—

Item the chamber as beds, coverlets,	
bolsters, sheets, bed cloths, and towels	10-
