

THE WAR.

We regret that Cpl. Cecil Hartwell was described in our last issue as Pte. Cecil Hartwell.

Pte. Cecil G. Agg is still going on well and Staff-Sergt, J. C. Wilson and Pte. L. Cockerton have both rejoined their units.

Pte. G. W. Nightingale is in hospital in Alexandria.

Pte. A. Huxley, who was reported wounded, has now recovered and been home on leave.

Pte. W. H. Yeates, who was admitted to hospital in Prance on October 4 suffering from a gunshot wound in the side, has now apparently rejoined his unit.

We are sorry to learn that Pte. A. E. Knight, who has already suffered so much from his wounds, is faced with the prospect of another operation.

Gunner C. W. Wilkins, R.F.A., has recently undergone an operation in India for the removal of a tumour from which, we understand, he was suffering before he joined the colours. He was in Mesopotamia when an operation was found to be necessary and was promptly sent back to India. When he last wrote home he was going on well and expected soon to be sent to the hills.

Gunner J. Perkins is now in hospital at Ware and expects to come home soon.

Pte. S. Harris has sustained wounds in the head and a broken ankle. He is in hospital at Gateshead and is going on well.

Pte. E. H. Hall is in hospital near Birmingham suffering from a crushed foot, the result of a football accident. The accident occurred behind the lines just after Pte. Hall had come out of the front line trenches and, although the affected part has been x-rayed twice, the patient has so far made very little progress.

Pte. F. Turner, A.V.C., has had a second attack of fever at Salonika but is now convalescent.

Pte. H. Sadler has been very severely wounded by shrapnel in the left thigh and in both feet. One great toe has been amputated and it was at one time thought that he would lose a foot. He is in Netley Hospital and is progressing as well as can be expected.
