In addition, over 100 children have been attending the special services on Wednesday afternoons.

Secondly, I commend the list of Services for Holy Week and Easter to your prayerful consideration. I earnestly hope that all who possibly can will come to the "Watch at the Cross" on Good Friday from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m. To those who have to work on this day as on other days, I commend the "Hymn Service of the Passion" at 7.30 p.m. To many people Good Friday will be just another Bank Holiday, with no thought of Him who gave His life for us all. Christian people will surely heed the question: "Could ye not watch with Me one hour?" Only those who have indeed "watched with Him" can really enter into the joy and wonder of Easter.

VESTRY MEETING AND A.P.C.M.

These Meetings on February 23rd were very well attended. At the Vestry Meeting the Vicar paid a warm tribute to the work of Messrs. G. A. King and G. A. Jones as Churchwardens and as Sequestrators. He again nominated Mr. King as Minister's Warden

and Mr. Jones was unanimously re-elected as

Parishioners' Warden.

At the A.P.C.M. Miss Sladden presented the revised Electoral Roll containing 377 names (an increase of 7). Two excellent reports followed: (1) by Miss Sladden on the work of the P.C.C. during the past year; (2) by Mr. King on the Fabric, Goods and Ornaments of the Church. Mr. King stressed the needs for various repairs to the Fabric. In a survey of the financial situation, Mr. C. A. Binyon stated that though the finances were in a satisfactory position, there would be heavy expenditure during the coming year. He estimated that at least £100 would have to be raised by special efforts, and this amount did not take into consideration the repairs mentioned by Mr. King. In the course of discussion, the Vicar was asked to bring to the notice of Churchpeople the need for more subscribers to the Envelope System. Several members present kindly volunteered to canvas donations for the upkeep of the Churchyard. The following elections took place:
