His second coming is variously interpreted. Maybe as in the case of His coming nineteen hundred years ago, when men's preconceived ideas were far astray, it will be so again. We need not trouble ourselves about the details of that coming, much less the time of it, for "of that day and hour knoweth no man." Faith is content to wait, and satisfied to repeat, "We believe that Thou shalt come to be our Judge."

Advent merges into Christmas, and as it does one is reminded of those lines of G. K. Chesterton:—

Tread gently under snow and rain

To reach the place where man may pray,

The way it is so very plain

That we may lose the way.

The way to Bethlehem would seem to be plain, yet very many miss it. The fact that we are outwardly merry, or that we join in the old Christmas revelry does not necessarily mean that we are truly happy, or that we have found the way to Bethlehem. That little town may remain a mere name, as remote from our daily life as it is from our parish. On the other hand, Bethlehem may be a constant inspiration, bringing true joy each Christmastide, and remembered throughout the year. Whether we class ourselves with the simple shepherds or with the wise men, Bethlehem calls us. The point is that the shepherds and the wise men were alive to the presence of God. If we have found the way to Bethlehem, our Christmas will be happy indeed. O come, let us adore Him!

CHURCH OF ENGLAND CHILDREN'S SOCIETY
