THE VICAR'S LETTER

21st November, 1949

My dear Friends,

am frequently asked the question "When shall we hear the Church Bells again?" Until now I have had to answer "I don't know," but now the answer is "It all depends on how parishioners respond to the appeal." At their meeting held to-night the members of the Parochial Church Council considered most carefully (1) The Repair of the Bells, (2) The extension to the Churchyard, (3) Further Repairs to the Church now that the work on the Tower has been completed. It was unanimously decided to issue an appeal for £1,000 in order to carry out all that is necessary. Approximately half of this sum—i.e. £,500 -is needed to repair and rehang the bells. This works out at about £60 per bell. It was decided that two of the bells thus repaired should constitute a memorial to the late Canon Allsebrook, and another a memorial to the late Mr. George Moisey. It was also agreed to ask for offers from individuals or institutions to make themselves responsible for the repair of a bell. I am very glad to announce that the members of the Mothers' Union have already promised to do this. Who will follow their example?

A circular letter, giving full details of the appeal, will be distributed shortly. For the time being, therefore, I content myself with the foregoing. The members of the Parochial Church Council are fully aware of the magnitude of the task, but are confident that all who love and value our Church will unite to

accomplish it.

I draw your attention to the list of Christmas Services, and would remind all Communicants of their duty.

Confirmation Classes will begin early in the New

Year.

ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS

The Church's year begins on Advent Sunday. This is the Sunday nearest to S. Andrew's Day (November 30th). The Advent season extends to Christmas Eve. It includes four Sundays, each of which has a distinctive message. Advent Sunday tells of our Lord's two comings, in great humility at Bethlehem to be our Saviour, and in glorious majesty hereafter to be our Judge. The second Sunday, commonly called 'Bible Sunday,' draws attention to His coming in His word. On the next Sunday there is brought to our notice the work of His ministers in preparing for His coming again. The message of the fourth Sunday in Advent is of our Lord's coming with grace to help and in mercy to deliver us in our struggle with sin.

As the penitential season of Lent precedes the festival of Easter, so the solemn Advent season culminates in the holy joy of Christmas. Those who know the true meaning of Christmas will not fail to find real happiness. We of the Church must do our best to create the right atmosphere and make the Church the brightest place in the parish this Christmastide, as befits the joyful message we pro-

claim—that unto us has been born a Saviour, Christ the Lord.

The vast majority of people in this country call themselves Christians. But only a minority will observe Christmas religiously. It is a strange Christianity which can neglect the worship of Christ on His birthday. When I say that only a minority will observe Christmas I do not mean that few people will have the day off, or that there will not be scenes of outward gaiety and rejoicing, with 'special Christmas attractions' and 'Xmas (what a word!) presents' in the shops. But this is not keeping Christmas as the Christian believes it should be kept. All the outward trappings are not to be confused with the real Christmas.

The true joy of Christmas belongs to those, and only those, who see in Jesus Christ God become man. To understand is to be compelled to worship Him. So the Christian will respond to the age-long invitation: 'O come, let us adore Him, Christ the

Lord.'

May the Holy Child bless you in your homes, filling your hearts with spiritual understanding, that so you may behold His glory Whose birthday you shall celebrate with joy.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND CHILDREN'S SOCIETY Christmas and the Children

Children have a happy knack of making themselves heard, felt and seen at all times, but at this season of the year they are more than ever in our thoughts. As we plan and scheme our way through the bleak austerity which confronts us, determined that its rigors shall not deprive our own little family of the happiness which is theirs by right and custom, it comes as something of a shock to ponder for a moment on the tremendous task which confronts the Church of England Children's Society in similar circumstances. Judged by any standard 5,000 children are a gigantic family, and year after year this Society feeds, clothes, trains and cares for these innocent victims of social misfortune and tragedy.

The passing of the Children Act in 1948 has not, as so many have supposed, conferred any financial benefits, and the Society remains as always a purely Voluntary Organisation of the Church. Space is too limited to relate its many achievements and only our imagination is necessary to create a vivid and soulstirring picture of the helpless babies, toddlers, cripples, the motherless and fatherless, the tragedy

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of broken families—all of them deprived through no fault of theirs of the love and affection which is every child's birthright.

For sixty-eight years the Society has been ministering to their needs, performing at the same time a valuable service to the Nation. Supported almost entirely by voluntary contribution it is now, because of greatly increased costs, faced with disturbing deficits on the General Fund. They cannot turn away the many deserving applicants which come to them every day and the children already in their care must not suffer. The fact that it costs 10/- every minute to feed their large family entirely apart from the question of clothing and housing, gives some idea of the magnitude of their task today, and it will undoubtedly induce in many of our hearts the urge to give generously at a time when, in spite of difficulties, we shall be enjoying the spirit of Christmas Good Will within the warm and comforting circle of family affection.

Those who read this can make their happiness the more complete by the consciousness of the simple

gratitude of some needy and helpless child.
