NOTES AND NOTICES

VESTRY MEETING AND A.P.C.M. — At the Vestry Meeting on March 3rd, Mr. G. A. King was again nominated as Vicar's Warden, and Mr. G. A. Jones was unanimously re-elected as People's Warden. Both Wardens were thanked for their services during the past year.

At the A.P.C.M. Mr. J. Major (Secretary, P.C.C.) presented the revised Electoral Roll, containing 374 names. Thanks were expressed to Miss M. E. Sladden for carrying through the work of revision. Two most interesting reports followed (1) by Mr. J. Major on the work of the P.C.C. during the past year, (2) by Mr. G. A. King on the Fabric, Goods, and Ornaments of the Church. The Financial Statement, presented by Mr. C. A. Binyon (Treasurer P.C.C.) showed Receipts amounting to £570 4s. 9d., and Payments to £367 11s. 7d.—a balance of Receipts over Payments of £202 13s. 2d. To this was to be added £,102 17s. 1d. (Balance in hand, 31st Dec., 1948) leaving an available Balance of £305 10s. 3d. Of this £245 had been transferred to the Fabric Fund (for the Repairs to the Tower), and the sum of £60 10s. 3d. carried forward.

Mr. Binyon reported that £424 (For the Repair of the Bells £277, for the Extension of the Churchyard and the completion of Repairs to the Church £147) had so far been received for the £1,000 Appeal Fund.
