#### THE CONFIRMATION

The Confirmation on Wednesday, April 5th, was deeply impressive. The Church was so full that it was decided to start the Service ten minutes before the appointed time. The atmosphere prevailing was most reverent and devout, and the Bishop's address on the text "Follow Thou Me" will surely linger long in our memories. All those confirmed (38 from Badsey and Aldington, 6 from Wickhamford) attended Service on Good Friday and made their first Communion on Easter Day. We hope the parents and friends of these will heed the Bishop's appeal to them to help the newly confirmed in every possible way. Certainly his appeal drew forth a response on Easter Day. May it continue. The following recent article deserves the attention of us all:—

There are few more encouraging sights than the crowds of Communicants on such Festivals as Easter and Christmas. The remark is often made 'If only all these people would come to Holy Communion on an ordinary Sunday.'!

Statistics show that :-

Of 100 children born in this country, 67 are baptised into the Church of England.

Of these 67, 34 subsequently attend Church of England Sunday Schools.

Of these 34, 26 go forward to Confirmation.

Of these 26, 9 make their communion at Easter (and in many cases only at Easter).

The question arises "Where are the 17"? What becomes of the lapsed Communicants?

If the Church could retain all those who are confirmed each year, the consequences might astonish us. The effect would almost certainly be felt outside as well as inside the Church. Parish priests spend long hours in preparing the candidates, but the more conscientious the clergy are the less they are satisfied with the amount of time that can be given to the classes.

It is obvious that something more is required besides the preparation classes. This can best be supplied by the parents or guardians of the young people. Unless the newly confirmed boy or girl has been accustomed to attending church regularly before Confirmation he or she starts with a big handicap. The chief responsibility, both before and after Confirmation, is that of the parents. In the first twelve months or two years after Confirmation most young people require the support of parents or guardians. It is then that habits of regular or irregular attendance are formed. Unless the parents accompany their son or daughter to Holy Communion it is asking a lot of the young person to be the only member of the houshold to get up and go to church in the early morning. However faithfully the conductor of the classes has prepared the candidates, the effect of a few weeks' or even a few months' preparation is likely to wear off unless it is followed up by home preparation and example. Parents can set their children an example by taking (not sending) their children. By so doing they will give the Church a chance to continue the preparation begun in the Confirmation Classes, which is, alas! so soon broken off. It is probably true to say that if the newly confirmed attend Holy Communion regularly during the first two years they will form a habit which will not easily be broken."
