To follow the example of Christ in home and daily life, and to bear personal witness to Him.

To be regular in private prayer day by day.

To read the Bible carefully.

To come to Church every Sunday.

To receive the Holy Communion faithfully and regularly.

To give personal service to Church, neighbours, and community.

To give money for the work of parish and diocese and for the work of the Church at home and overseas.

THE DIOCESAN MISSION

As is generally known, a Mission is to be held throughout the Diocese of Worcester in October, 1951. The main stages of the Mission are:—

- (1) A year of preparation in every parish, beginning October, 1950.
- (2) The preaching of the Message of the Mission in every parish by expert Missioners from outside the Diocese. This will last for one week and will be followed by:—
- (3) A week of Acts of Witness, Mass Meetings, etc.

In Badsey and Wickhamford the preaching of the Message of the Mission will be from Oct. 10th to Oct. 17th, and the Missioner will be the Rev. Canon J. Gray, Rector of Barwick-in-Elmet (near) Leeds. In most parishes the date of this second stage of the Mission will be from Oct. 14th to Oct. 21st, but we have altered our date to suit the convenience of the Missioner. I am very glad indeed to secure Canon Gray, who was my predecessor at Featherstone. He has had wide experience as a Missioner, and I cannot think of anyone more suitable for our needs. He is a most eloquent and persuasive Preacher, a man of deep spirituality and great sincerity. I hope he will be able to pay us a visit during the autumn of this year in order that he may become acquainted with Badsey and Wickhamford, and help us to formulate our plans. I shall, of course, be making further references to this great venture. Meanwhile I ask you to pray for God's blessing on the Mission, and on him who will conduct it.

SERMONS

A sermon on 'Sermons' might, with advantage, be preached in every church. An appropriate text would be: 'Take heed what ye hear.' What we hear depends much upon ourselves. One listens in a critical frame of mind and expects, and perhaps hopes, to find flaws in the speaker's argument; he finds them. Another hearer has come to seek help from the speaker. He, too, finds what he wants. Others are more concerned with the length of the sermon than with what is in it.

The sermon is a responsibility which the congregation shares in some degree with the preacher. Some sermons fail because of the preacher, and some because of the hearers. 'Efficiency in the pulpit,' wrote Bishop Hensley Henson, 'is conditioned to an extent which it is difficult to exaggerate by appreciation in the pew.' One of the greatest preachers said: 'You can't expect fire in the pulpit when there are icebergs in the pews.' A church which is nearly empty makes empty the preacher's heart, and takes the joy out of the most earnest message. Anxious as every preacher ought to be to give of his best to the faithful few, he is an exceptional man who is not sensitive to the atmosphere created by a large audience.

The preacher's difficulties are threefold. He is addressing a silent and undemonstrative audience. Whereas the platform speaker may be cheered or heckled the preacher finds it difficult, if not impossible, to gauge the reaction of his hearers. An interruption from the body of the hall often gives the experienced speaker a splendid opportunity to make an apt retort. In any case it shows the speaker what some of his audience are thinking. The preacher receives no such guidance.

Another difficulty (some preachers would account it the greatest) is the varied nature of the average congregation. It may easily contain persons whose ages range from eight to eighty years, as well as men and women of very different mental calibre. It will also contain people of varied religious experiences, some of whom require feeding with the milk of the word, whilst others need strong meat.

A third great difficulty is that the preacher is expected to give a worthwhile message in about a quarter of an hour. Of course, there are occasions when this is an ample allowance of time, but there are important matters which cannot be satisfactorily dealt with in much longer time than fifteen minutes. If the preacher could be sure that the same congregation would be present on the following two or three Sundays it would be comparatively easy to divide the sermon into as many parts. Under modern conditions each sermon has to be complete in itself, and this is probably the reason why courses of sermons are not now so frequent as once they were. The demand for short sermons means that most of them may be more properly described as "brief homilies." They are often good, as far as they go. But do they go far enough? It is quite impossible to give adequate teaching on the main doctrines of the Christian Faith in a few moments on odd occasions. Hence the widespread ignorance of religious truth and of the meaning of Church membership.
