MODERN CHURCH FINANCE

Many complaints are heard about the increase in the quota, both from the parishes to the diocese and from the dioceses to the Central Board of Finance at Westminster. But is there any business, household or society whose running expenses have not increased considerably in recent years? The Church's budget should be able to pass the most careful scrutiny, but it must not be forgotten that as the work expands it inevitably costs more.

The plain fact is that the Church of England has for long been living on the generosity of its past benefactors, and that very few churches have been fully maintained by the offerings of their parishioners. Of every pound received by an incumbent in one diocese, an average of 16s. 10d. comes from past endowments, 2s. 6d. from present contributions, and 8d. from fees. Recent legislation, beginning with the Tithe Act in 1936, has had the effect of appreciably reducing the Church's income. This, coupled with the general fall in rates of interest, and the much higher cost of living, has brought about a difficult, if not critical, situation.

Compared with those of other Churches (e.g. the Church in Wales) members of the Church of England do not contribute their due share towards its upkeep. Official figures show that although many G. Jeffreys. Please make a note of these dates. people attend church at such festivals as Christmas and Easter they give little support at other times. If Easter communicants only are reckoned, an extra shilling a week from each of them would provide a further $£5\frac{1}{2}$ million a year.

It is unsatisfactory that the upkeep of the Church should largely depend upon a comparatively few regular church-goers. Many reformers would like to see the Sunday collection in its present form abolished. It encourages spasmodic and unsystematic giving, and allows large numbers of people to be satisfied with the giving of a chance coin, many of them only on the infrequent occasions when they attend Church. Nor should the Church's finances have to depend so much upon the weather and other uncertain factors. A fourth-rate athletic club would not be content to rely upon the passing round of the hat or a collection bag each week. Members pay a fixed subscription to their club irrespective of the

number of times they visit it during the year. It would be thought unreasonable if a club had to make plans to pay its staff, and carry on its activities without knowing what it would receive from its members. Why should the Church have to humiliate itself by frequent begging appeals to those who claim its benefits? It is said of some of the clergy that they are 'always making appeals for money.' If so, whose is the blame? No one dislikes these appeals more than the clergy themselves. Instead of being left free to get on with their real work, for which they were ordained, many of the clergy spend much of their time and energy in devising schemes for raising money. The pity is that so many parishes are content to go on in the bad old way of Church finance. Love of their Church and appreciation of its work should make unnecessary all pleading for the support of its professing members. Until the day comes when members of the Church regard it as an obligation to make a regular weekly, monthly, or annual offering to their Church, its finances will continue to give anxiety. Far too long the financial burden, which should be shared by all, has been borne by the few.
