DIOCESAN MISSION (OCT., 1951)

The First Stage of the Mission—A Year of-Preparation, from Oct., 1950, to Oct., 1951 — was inaugurated by a Diocesan Service in the Cathedral on Saturday, Oct. 7th. Nearly 3,000 people, representative of all the parishes in the Diocese, were present. The Service ended with a corporate Act of Dedication led by the Bishop of Worcester. This Act of Dedication included the recital by the congregation of the Mission Prayer—"O God, bless the Bishop of Worcester's Mission to my soul and to the souls of many more, and use us in Thy service, for Jesus Christ's sake. Amen."

It was most encouraging to have the Badsey Parish Room filled with members of the Mothers' Union and Sanctuary Guild of Badsey and Wickhamford on Tuesday, Oct. 10th, to hear what our own Missioner had to say with regard to the work of preparation. Canon Gray's address was listened to with rapt attention and all were deeply impressed by the utter sincerity and deep spirituality of his words. He emphasised the need for earnest and expectant prayer, and for a more devout performance of the primary Christian duties. He urged us to strive to interest those in our immediate circle in the Mission and to keep before our minds the primary object of the Mission, i.e., to "convert" the two parishes to God and to the Christian way of life. We must show those "on the fringe" that we were really in earnest. In this connection regular attendance at public worship in God's House on God's Day was of paramount importance. By this we made a public confession of our faith, and showed we were "not ashamed to confess the faith of Christ Crucified." If people outside saw that we were only casual about this, how could we expect them to be anything but casual? The state of the world to-day, the fact that the Church everywhere was faced with hostility and indifference, revealed the need for such efforts as the Mission. The Mission was not an "isolated stunt." It needed to be carefully prepared for and zealously followed up.

Canon Gray also spoke to a Joint Meeting of the Badsey and Wickhamford Parochial Church Councils on Wed., Oct. 11th. Again his address was listened

to with the closest attention, and the discussion which followed was of great help in clearing up difficulties and enabling us to gain a clearer view of what was really needed during this year of preparation. I think we all felt how fortunate we are to have secured so experienced a Missioner as Canon Gray and that his preliminary visit left us much to ponder over and to pray about.

A good many people have taken copies of the Mission Prayer Manual and I hope they will be used regularly in public and private prayer.

Saturday, Oct. 7th. Nearly 3,000 people, representative of all the parishes in the Diocese, were present. The Service ended with a corporate Act of Dedication still in the future. I hope very much that such a Group will be formed.
