THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

In order that this issue of the Parish Magazine may be in your hands at the beginning of the month, this letter has to be written a week before Christmas. The Parish Christmas Card, recently circulated, has conveyed to you my good wishes for this season as well as giving you a list of the Christmas Services. As I write, the international situation is still very serious, and there is a most urgent call to all Christian people to pray for the establishment of a true and lasting peace among the nations, and that all who bear the heavy responsibility of government and leadership may be guided aright at this time of crisis.

Compared with such questions, our own local affairs seem very trivial, but so much has happened during the past year in our parochial life that I feel I ought to say a word or so about them. As regards Badsey, the splendid response to the £1,000 Appeal Fund has enabled us (1) to complete the work on the Tower (at a cost of over £500), (2) to repair and rehang the Bells, and (3) to commence work on the extension to the Churchyard. We shall soon have to face another heavy expense, i.e., to repair the ravages of the wood beetle in the Church. What we have so far accomplished, however, leads us to hope that it will be possible to proceed with this very urgent work, and so take a further step towards our main objective of putting our Church into a first rate condition of repair.

At Wickhamford, the repairs to the Tower and the Windows have been executed. Our next task will be the repairs to the Roof, and this, I fear, will prove to be a very heavy task.

These matters have, of necessity, taken up much of our time and attention lately. It should never be forgotten, however, that the work of the Church is primarily spiritual, and that such things as I have mentioned are but means to an end—the increased efficiency of the work of the Church.

It is quite impossible to draw up a spiritual "profit and loss account" at the end of a year. God alone is the Judge of what has been done by and through the Church. All that we can do is to note where progress seems to have been made, and to acknowledge humbly how much has been left undone. The season of Lent calls us to deal with these questions. In view

of the early date of Easter this year, this solemn season will soon be on us—Wed., Feb. 7th, is Ash Wednesday. It ought to have a special significance for us as we prepare for the Diocesan Mission in October.

I pray that God's blessing may rest upon you all in the New Year and upon all our work and worship in His Name.

As I write, the words on a New Year Card are before me—" In the New Year, let us Sunday by Sunday serve the Lord with gladness and come before His Presence with a song of thanksgiving; for He is gracious, His mercy is everlasting; His truth endureth from generation to generation."
