SUNDAY SCHOOL. — The New Year Party on Sat., Jan. 13th, passed off very happily. The success of it was due to the generous gifts of many friends, and the hard work put in by parents and teachers who prepared the Teas for the Juniors and Seniors. We are also most grateful to (1) Mr. Robinson for the provision of Milk, (2) Mrs. Johns and Mr. L. Mustoe for Apples, (3) The Badsey Mummers for entertaining us after Tea, and (4) Mr. Henry King who, with the assistance of Mr. L. Bott, delighted a large and enthusiastic audience with a display of Films.

P.C.C.—At the January Meeting it was agreed that the Church Fête should be held on Sat., June 23rd, and the Harvest Thanksgiving and Gift Day on Sunday, Sept. 30th. The estimate (£310) of Messrs. Furse Ltd. for the repair and spraying of Roof Timbers damaged by wood beetle was accepted. It is hoped to proceed with this work in the Spring. The following letter from Miss E. N. Sladden was read by the Vicar:—

The land at the east end of the Churchyard, standing in my name, has now been legally handed over to the P.C.C. I enclose a cheque for £120 towards the cost of the extension of the Churchyard. This amount is the balance left over from the letting of some of the cottages after the original cost of buying the land had been paid off. It is a great happiness to all the members of our family to see the scheme, visualised by my father years ago, being undertaken. There will be no fees of any kind for the P.C.C. to pay, as I have paid all that is necessary, and Mr. K. G. Johnson has very kindly given his legal services.

"It was my father's expressed wish that the Oak Tree should remain a permanent addition to the extended Churchyard. My brother Cyril, when a child, picked up an acorn and planted it in a bottle of water; it took root and was put out into his own little patch of garden where he tended it for a few years. My father then suggested that it should be transferred to its present position, where, if it flourished, it would grow into a sizeable tree by the time there was any chance of extending the churchyard to the roadway east of the church — a project about which he was very keen. The transfer of the young tree was carried out on December 15th, 1902, the date of the 25th anniversary of my parents' wedding; they were both present, and my mother planted the little tree. It came perilously near to dying, on one or two occasions, but has fortunately survived and is now well established. Although its story is of special family interest, I think it might also be of interest to future generations to know when and why it was planted in the new part of the churchyard."

The Vicar expressed the gratitude of the members of the P.C.C. to Miss Sladden.

MEN'S FELLOWSHIP.—We were very fortunate in securing Major S. B. Carter to speak at the Meeting on Jan. 9th. His talk on "Rural France" was a delightful combination of a description of the various rural occupations and industries, coupled with an analysis of the outlook on national and international problems by an agricultural community. In his usual fascinating manner he forcibly impressed upon us that the contemplation of these problems from a merely parochial angle is detrimental to any country. We should remember that there are many serious matters to claim our attention besides (as he expressed it) "the price of sprouts." The principles he put before us showed the way to the development of democratic citizenship. Thank you, Major Carter!

We hope there will be a good gathering on Tuesday, Feb. 13th, to hear Mr. J. Rayson give his talk on "Highways and By-Ways."
