#### A Message from The Bishop

Hartlebury Castle, Kidderminster.

My Friends,

Nearly a year ago I wrote a letter to the parishes of this Diocese, telling you all about our forthcoming Mission from October 14th—28th next. As we are drawing near to the time of the Mission I am writing a second letter, not merely as a reminder, but rather

to explain what we are trying to do.

The world seems very disturbed and most people live under the strain and stress of modern conditions. In addition, there hangs over us the threat of another war. If our belief is simply that there is nothing beyond this life we naturally try to make the best of a bad job. But when Christ came He spoke to us of a life beyond the grave, of a Heavenly Father Who loves us and cares for our welfare, of the meaning of prayer and the help and joy we can find as we relate our lives to God.

The Mission is planned to explain how ordinary folk like you and me can find God personally as our Father. You see it is like this. When Christ came He brought to mankind a message from God. He showed how much God wanted to help us and He gave an open invitation to us all to come to God because He, understanding our need, could make something new

of our lives.

Those of us who have sought to follow Christ and His way of life have found in Him a personal Friend, and this experience has made all the difference in our lives, in our homes, and in our work.

The Mission will seek to explain this more fully. When you think of your own need of God remember

there is a way of peace that God offers us.

Because of this we plan the Mission in your parish. Will you come to the Services? Will you come and hear an explanation of man's need and God as the answer?

We all have a lot to learn ourselves and it is not our wish merely to preach to other people. But rather we want to share with you what we have discovered for ourselves about God and His love, about Christ and His sacrifice for us, about the forgiveness of sins, the peace and joy God gives, the new way through Christ into a new life, that is life eternal and abundant.

If we leave God out, and try to live as though God did not exist, our problems increase, but if we bring God into our lives we at once find how real He is, how ready to hear our cry, how willing to come to

our aid.

I pray God to bless you and your home and work, and may I add how much I hope that we may share together in this message of the Mission.
