The glory of the Mount of Transfiguration is followed by the grimness of the valley below. After seeing the Risen Lord, the disciples "went away

unto their own homes."

The "atmosphere" of a Mission is followed by the grey days, the steady plod, sometimes the hard trudge, in the common round and the trivial task.

In the days ahead may we all do what we can to keep the pledge and promise of our Memorial Card, and then in our inmost hearts we shall become aware that to have known this week will never pass.

On the final day of the Mission, Sunday, Oct. 21st, the Epistle read for the day (Trinity XXII) contains these words, "being confident of this very thing, that he who hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ."

He will perform it if we let Him, for remember that

as free souls we can refuse Him.

You will therefore let Him perform the good work begun in you by praying and planning how best to follow up the Mission:

"Lord what will Thou have me to do"

"Here am I; send me."

Be prepared, be willing, be expectant, and it will be shown you what you must do.

May God bless, guide and keep you in all your

work for Him.
