#### (2) The Bible Reading Fellowship.

During the course of the Mission, Canon Gray laid emphasis on the value of this Fellowship and a Branch is now being formed as part of the "Follow Up" of the Mission. The Fellowship issues quarterly Leaflets giving short passages—with notes—from the Bible for daily reading. The spiritual message of the Bible is brought out and difficult passages explained in a simple and straightforward manner. There are four series of quarterly Leaflets:—

A; B for Adults; Y for Youths; 2/- a year.

C for Children; 1/6 a year.

Specimen Leaflets may be seen on the B.R.F. table in Badsey Church, and application forms for membership and further information can be obtained from Mr. A. L. Byrd, who has kindly offered to act as Secretary.

It is asked that completed forms, with subscriptions, be handed to the Secretary not later than Sunday, Dec. 16th, in order that a start can be made in the New Year with the first quarterly leaflets.

About 20 members of the congregation have already applied for forms, and we hope that many others will follow suit.
