BADSEY AND ALDINGTON NOTES THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear Friends, In the Magazine for January, 1951, I wrote these words, "The international situation is still very serious and there is a most urgent call to all Christian people to pray for the establishment of a true and lasting peace among the nations, and that all who bear the heavy responsibility of government and leadership may be guided aright at this time of crisis." During the past twelve months there has been, alas! little change in the situation and the call to prayer remains. It is a call to pray together, as members of God's family in God's House. Will you resolve to do this regularly in 1952? As we look out upon a riven, distracted world, and realise the needs of men everywhere and our own needs, how poor seem the excuses that people make for their neglect to "assemble and meet together (1) to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at His hands, (2) to set forth His most worthy praise, (3) to hear His most holy word, and (4) to ask those things which are requisite and necessary, as well for the body as the soul."

The past year has again been a memorable one in the history of our Church. Following on the repairs to the Tower and the Bells, the work of the repair of the Roof and the decoration of the Church have been completed. As far as we know, the Church is now in first rate order, both externally and internally. The dedication of the Churchyard Extension, the Lych Gate and the Churchyard Lamps is still fresh in our minds. The cost of all these improvements is approximately £2,000, and we can look back on what has been done during the past two years with justifi-

able pride.

The other outstanding event was the Diocesan Mission in October. I can only repeat that it is very difficult to assess the results of this. Results there have been, and I believe that many have cause to thank God for blessings received. We were indeed fortunate in our Missioner, and no one could have given himself more wholeheartedly to the work of the Mission. The formation of a branch of the Bible Reading Fellowship is a notable result of the Mission, and such a venture has infinite possibilities.

The Rite of Confirmation will be administered by The Rt. Rev. Bishop Lasbery in our Church on Wed., March 12th. Preparation Classes are now

being formed.

I pray that God's blessing may rest upon you all in the New Year, and upon all our work and worship in His Name.

My dear Friends,

The death of Mr. Ted Hall, with such suddenness, came as a great shock to us all. Even now it is difficult to realise that we shall no longer see his familiar figure. The attendance at the Funeral Service was a sincere tribute to the affection and esteem with which he was regarded, not only in Badsey and Wickhamford, but throughout the Vale of Evesham. His ready wit and humour cheered and helped us on countless occasions. As the Rural Dean, in his address, said, "He radiated happiness because he himself, despite frequent ill-health, knew the secret of true happiness, and he loved his fellow-men because he loved God." Numerous people will remember with gratitude his many acts of kindness. The sick and those in trouble will not readily forget the help and comfort he extended to them. He loved our Church and was ever ready to recount its history to visitors, just as he was invariably among the first to support any special effort on its behalf, e.g. he was making articles for the Christmas Gift Sale on the day before he died. His passing is a grievous loss, but those of us who were privileged to enjoy his triendship will treasure our recollections of one who was in every sense "a happy warrior."

Mrs. Hall and the members of his family are

assured of our deepest sympathy.

The Christmas Gift Sale was a very great success and the financial result really amazing. To raise the sum of £262 was a striking testimony to (1) the organising ability of Mrs. Batty and Mrs. Sandys-Lumsdaine, (2) the willing and skilful help of those who made articles for the Sale, (3) the generous gifts of friends over a wide area, (4) the persuasive charm of those who gathered in goods from many sources. It is quite impossible to individualise; all we can do is to offer most sincere thanks to all who helped in any way. Mention must be made, however, of the great debt we owe to Mr. and Mrs. Batty and Mrs. Sandys-Lumsdaine for the use of their beautiful house for the Sale, and for their unsparing efforts

to ensure its success. We hope that they feel that such a result was some reward, at any rate, for all they did. There was no doubt regarding the impression made on the crowds of visitors when first they saw the lay-out of the Sale, and when, later, they viewed the flood-lit Church (for which, as for other striking lighting effects, we are indebted to Mr. J. E. Parry). They were unanimous in agreeing that it was a memorable occasion, as indeed it was — something which will be spoken of for a very long time. We are very grateful to Miss Georgie Henschal for coming to Wickhamford to open the Sale, and for her delightful little speech.
