My dear Friends,

As I write, Christmas is still in the future and therefore, reference to the Services during this great Festival must be left over until next month's issue. I should like, however, to express my gratitude to (1) Mesdames Chapman, W. H. Reed, L. H. Sparrow, G. H. Stewart, C. Stewart, A. Reed, Miss Agg and members of the Third Sunday Group for the beautiful decoration of the Church, (2) Miss Norah Smith who not only lent her Christmas Crib, but also, with the assistance of Mr. M. H. Harvey and Mr. G. A. King, set it up in Church, (3) Mr. Henry King, Mrs. Marshall and the members of the Choir for the excellent

Carol Service on Sunday, Dec. 21st.

I shall soon have completed five years as your Vicar. They have been eventful years and, with the loval and generous help of those who love and value our Churches in Badsey and Wickhamford, much has been done in the way of repairs and improvements. In spiritual matters, too, I believe there has been progress. Of this, however, God alone is the Judge. But while so many problems remain and while so much still requires to be done, there can be no feeling of complacency either on the part of the Vicar or of those members of the laity who really desire to see the Church a living and growing force. There are still numbers of people who declare that "they don't go to Church but are as good as those who do," or else aver that they "can be Christians without being members of the Church." There are many who need the Church for Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals, but who never stop to think who is responsible for its maintenance at other times. And what of parents who think it is a good thing to send their children to Sunday School until Confirmation age, and then, after the children have been confirmed, leave them to their own devices—just when parental help and example are most needed? There are those who object to the Vicar speaking of "the duty of worship" have they forgotten what the Catechism says—" My duty towards God is to believe in Him, to fear Him and to love Him with all my heart, with all my mind, with all my soul and with all my strength; to worship Him, to give Him thanks, to put my whole trust in Him, to call upon Him, to honour His Holv Name and His Word, and to serve Him truly all the days of my life "?

Yes, much remains to be done and I am deeply grateful for those who realise this, those who still believe in the Church in spite of its faults, and who

really do try to do their duty to it.

The coming year will be a memorable one. I hope in the near future to draw attention to the great spiritual lessons of the Coronation Service. We must always remember that the Coronation is much more than an historic pageant; it is a deeply significant religious rite. There is a call to all of us to dedicate ourselves to the service of God and our fellow men as our young Queen will do. As the Dean of Westminster has said, "The Queen will be setting the seal on that very moving vow which she took on her twenty-first birthday, when she vowed that she would devote her ife, whether it be long or short, to the service of her beople, and concluded with these words, 'I shall not have strength to carry out this resolution unless you oin in it with me, as I invite you to do. God help ne to make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share it with me.' "

I pray that God's blessing may rest upon you all in the New Year, and upon all our work and worship in His Name.
