CORONATION DAY (June 2nd, 1953)

(1) In London.

The Mothers' Union seats near Buckingham Palace were in the best position of the whole route so we had a wonderful view of the processions as they went and returned. I arrived at the stand at 5.50 a.m. and left at 6.30 p.m. During that time there were several storms but there was so much to see that we didn't notice the rain. The colours were so beautiful that it was like a fairy story come to life. The perfect timing of everything and the rhythm of it all were really wonderful. After the procession had gone an announcer described the arrival of the Queen at the Abbey and the Service was relayed to us. It was most impressive to hear all the people on the stands singing, "All people that on Earth do dwell" and joining in the Service. I was talking to a Yorkshire lady just before I left and mentioned Mrs. Chapman's name. I was most surprised to hear someone say, "Do you come from Badsey?" I had been sitting near friends of the Vicar and Mrs. Chapman all day and did not know until then!

The Catering Committee had spared no effort in providing an excellent meal. This was followed by a Mixed Football Match, and Tug-of-War Tournaments, ladies and gentlemen respectively.

The weather finally put an end to outdoor activities and the villagers congregated in the Mission Hall, where we were entertained by the amusing conjuring

tricks of Mr. Mabberley.

The day concluded with a most enjoyable Social Evening, during which the Vicar and Mrs. Chapman distributed the prizes to the winners of the day's events.

(5) In Wickhamford.

Coronation Day at Wickhamford was celebrated in traditional style. In the morning a Service was held at the Parish Church, conducted by the Vicar, and there was a good congregation. After the Service two Television Sets, generously lent and installed by Mr. H. C. Dillworth, of Evesham, provided the parishioners with a view of the whole of the Coronation Ceremony in Westminster Abbey. In the afternoon a Fancy Dress Parade of children and adults assembled at Sandys Avenue and processed, headed by Lyddiatts Orchestration, to Manor Close, where Mrs. J. Mason, the oldest inhabitant, planted a commemorative tree. The children then processed through the Village and assembled in a field, kindly lent for the occasion by Mrs. Daffurn, where the fancy dresses were judged by Mrs. C. Green and the Misses E. and A. Burrows. During this period, orchestrations were given over amplifiers by Mr. C. Green. Children and Adults then joined in Sports Events, followed by Tea, served to the children by a willing company of ladies. They also received a stick of barley sugar and an ice cream. Most of the adults watched the procession of the Queen through the London streets and Tea was served. The competitions during the afternoon included bowling for a pig, kindly given by Mr. W. Batty, and a Tea Service for bowling by the ladies, kindly given by Mrs. M. Dean. The day concluded with a Buffet and Dance in the Memorial Hall until midnight, everyone having enjoyed a full day.

The Hall was tastefully decorated for the occasion and a replica of the Coronation Crown hung in the

centre.

The day's success could not have been achieved but for the hard work put in by the Committee, the Hon. Secretary, Mrs. T. Shannon-Garvey, and all the ladies and others who gave their services so willingly.

A sum of about £39 is in hand and the Committee has decided to call a Parish Meeting as to its disposal.

LOOKING BACK

THE LATE MISS KATHLEEN SLADDEN

The news of the death of Miss Kathleen Sladden was received with deep regret by her friends in Badsev. A Service in Beaconsfield Church on Saturday, May 30th, attended by many friends, was followed by Cremation at Oxford. The committal was in Badsey Churchyard after a Service in Church. Miss Sladden was born at Badsey and was educated at St. Stephen's High School, Clewer, and at Royal Holloway College, Egham, where she had won a scholarship. She took a second-class in the honours school of Mathematics of Oxford University. Her teaching career was in London, first as lecturer under the L.C.C. at Moorfields Training College, until this closed down, then as mathematics specialist at Carlyle Girls' Secondary School, Chelsea, until her retirement in 1941. The school was evacuated twice, during both world wars, its buildings being taken over for a hospital in 1914, and pupils and staff dispersed to other schools. In 1939 the school was evacuated to Windsor. After retiring, Miss Sladden lived with a friend in Beaconsfield, where she took an active part in local affairs and made a wide circle of friends.

We extend our deep sympathy to the members of

her family.

A green Chalice Veil and Burse—the gift of the Sunday School—was dedicated at the Sung Eucharist on Sunday, June 7th.
