WHAT NOW?

After seeing the Coronation film, someone remarked to me: "It makes you want to be good." And the Archbishop, speaking to representatives of the Youth of the Commonwealth on the Sunday after the Coronation, said that "The Queen had taken us out of ourselves into a world of chivalry and glory, where men and women, old and young, have a single desire to do something, to give themselves away, in order to show their humble and loyal devotion."

The Archbishop went on to say that during the Coronation Service something happened to people all over Great Britain and far afield that they had not expected. "An emotion was stirred at a far richer and deeper level than is ordinarily reached." They had come to watch, they remained to pray and share with the young Queen in her act of dedication.

Such were our sentiments at the time—but what now—are they lasting or are they already passing into the shadows of a fleeting memory? We should be horrified at the suggestion that for the Queen they should not be permanent and unbreakable. Her high calling is for life. The burden is heavy and must at times chafe her young shoulders, but she cannot relinquish it. She herself has declared, however, that she has not the strength to bear it without our full support. Dare we ask her to carry on if we stand aside and return to our old ways of self indulgence?
