Then he added, "And we have let ourselves be taken in."

A CHALLENGE

"How shall we teach
A child to reach
Beyond himself and touch
The stars,
We who have stooped so much?

"How shall we tell

Religion to-day apparently is not very popular. But, then, true religion never has been. The Founder of Christianity was despised, rejected, crucified! In laying down His terms for would-be-disciples, Jesus said: "If any man would come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me." And those are still the authoritative terms of Christian discipleship. Jesus never lowers His standard. He is absolutely straight in His dealings with men.

Why is it that to-day comparatively few respond to the Call and Challenge of Jesus Christ and become His true followers? To that question many answers may be given. But, behind all other reasons and excuses, lies one supreme reason. It is this. Men do not follow Jesus, because they shirk His demands; they are not prepared to make the sacrifices and render

the service that He requires.

Some, indeed, profess to scorn Christianity as an effeminate thing. They protest that they are far too manly to have anything to do with it. The truth is that Jesus demands more manhood, more strength of character, more moral courage and endurance than they are prepared to give. The service of Jesus Christ is no task for the chicken-hearted. It is something far more strenuous than "froth-blowing." And if the Church is faithful in her testimony, she can never make religion an easy thing. The man who is going to be an out-and-out Christian must not expect a soft time. If he is to be a faithful soldier of Jesus Christ, he will have to endure hardness. He will often have

to stand alone. But if he stands true to Jesus Christ, he will attain to the strongest, purest manhood. He will render the best service to his fellows. He will gain "the life that is life indeed."

"Without Sunday Worship it is doubtful how long England will continue to be a Christian country. Worship gives the worshipper both a vision of God in His beauty and majesty and helps him to make a solemn and intelligent offering to his Creator and Redeemer."
