FROM THE EDITOR'S SCRAP BOOK

"Advent merges into Christmas, and as it does so one is reminded of these lines of Mr. G. K. Chesterton:

Tread gently under snow and rain,

To reach the place where man may pray

The way it is so very plain That we may lose the way.

The way to Bethlehem would seem to be plain, yet very many miss it. The fact that we are outwardly merry, or that we join in the old Christmas revelry does not necessarily mean that we are truly happy or that we have found the way to Bethlehem. That little town nestling amid the Judean hills may remain a mere name, as remote from our daily life as it is far from our parish. Or Bethlehem may be a constant inspiration, bringing true joy each Christmastide and remembered throughout the year. Whether we class ourselves with the simple shepherds or with the wise men, Bethlehem calls us. Shepherds and wise men are alive to the presence of God. The shepherds are so simple that they make no claim to wisdom; the wise men are so wise that they know their littleness in God's sight. If we have found the way to Bethlehem, our Christmas will be a happy one indeed."

"Out of the whirling dance of death,
Down from the hills of strife,
We come to the glow of the little cave
Of the Little Lord of life.

The thunderings of our hate-strewn world
Are hushed for an Infant's cries;
And Peace, poor fugitive, makes her home
In a Maiden's reverent eyes.

POSTSCRIPT

Appeal for Civilian Relief in Korea

An urgent appeal for the basic needs of Patients in Hospital has been received from two British Red Cross Trained Nurses, sent out last August, working in the Red Cross Hospital at Seoul, and the Children's T.B. Sanatorium at Inchon, and they will soon be operating a Mobile Clinic in the surrounding districts. They will shortly have at their disposal Invalid Foods and Medical Supplies from Red Cross and St. John Stores. The Hospital at Seoul was very badly damaged during the fighting but it has been patched up to take 200 Patients. They will have to face the intense cold of the coming winter, lying on the bare springs of their beds, and without any of those comforts considered necessary and essential for their well-being. The children at the T.B. Sanatorium most of whom are in a sadly emaciated condition have no warm clothing. The two B.R.C.S. Nurses, Miss Jordan and Miss Deadman, have reported and listed what they consider is most desperately needed for (1) A Baby o-2 years; (2) A Toddler 2-5 years; (3) Child 5—16 years and (4) An Adult.

Society could help by way of contributing any one specific parcel together with the postage, and should be very happy to supply information as to the proposed contents of same.
