BADSEY AND ALDINGTON NOTES

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING .-This Meeting will be held in the Parish Room on Thursday, February 4th, at 7.15 p.m. It will be preceded at 7 p.m. by the Vestry Meeting for the nomination and election of Churchwardens. All members of the Electoral Roll should regard it as a duty to attend. Reports on the work of the Parochial Church Council during the past year and of the condition of the Fabric and Ornaments of the Church will be pre-sented, in addition to the annual Financial Statement. The Parochial Church Council for the ensuing year will be elected, and representatives to the Diocesan and Ruridecanal Conferences appointed.

The Financial Statement shews General Fund Receipts of £479, contributions to Special Objects £210, and Fête Receipts £252. In addition there are the Altar Fund Collections, and the amounts raised by the Mothers' Union and Sunday School, bringing the total receipts to over £1,000. This is a remarkable achievement in view of what has been raised during the past five years for the repair and improvement of the Church, and the extension of the Churchyard, and shews how generously Church people continue to give.

P.C.C. At the meeting on January 7th the follow-

(3) That the fire prevention measures recommended by the Chief Officer of the Worcester City and County Fire Brigade be carried out.

(4) That a Board commemorating the "Coronation Peal" be installed in the Ringing Chamber (see below).
(5) That the annual Church Fête be held on Satur-

day, June 26th.

(6) That the Quarterly Collection for the work of the Church Overseas be held on Sunday evening, February 21st.

(7) That the Brass Book Rest, no longer in use, be donated to the Garrison Church of All Saints',

Pusan, Korea.

The cost of the "Peal Board," mentioned above, will be £15 (approx.). Several members of the P.C.C. kindly offered contributions. Further offers will be gratefully received by the Treasurer.
