WHITSUNDAY

On Whitsunday the Christian Church keeps high festival, for on this day, referred to in the Acts of the Apostles as the Day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit came upon the Apostles and changed them from timid followers of Christ into men whom their opponents accused of "turning the world upside down." No one can read the Acts, especially the early chapters, without noting in the disciples a release from tension, a banishment of fears and a wonderful sense of confidence in men who but a few weeks before were defeatist in attitude and weefully weak in witness. They knew their inadequacy. Their self-confidence had been shattered at Calvary when they failed Christ miserably. It was the consciousness of a power beyond themselves and at their disposal which enabled them to lift their heads and look one another in the face, and stand up to the very people who had crucified their Master and who knew all about their weakness. Only the certain knowledge that Christ was alive could have made this startling difference, this and the equally certain fact that they were conscious of a power which had taken possession of them. The point of the observance of Whitsuntide is that we give thanks for the coming of this Holy Power. Much of the tension and strain of life is due to an inner sense of in-adequacy. We secretly feel that we are not equal to the demands of life and this inward uneasiness makes us strain and strive. We waste energy which should be kept for the task in hand. We ourselves cannot supply the power to meet life. That is God's part. Our part is to draw upon His power through quiet dependence upon Him. This is the secret of relaxation, our realization of the fact that we may draw upon the power of God's Holy Spirit. The disciples, we are told, went everywhere, "the Lord working with them." So He will work with and through us.

THE CHURCH ROOF

Extracts from the Architect's Report Chancel Roof: It is obvious that all the laths, or the great majority of them, have perished, simply, I think, from old age. It was not re-lathed during the 1902 restoration and possibly not at the 1850 one. Further patching is money thrown away. It must be stripped. I advise using a dark grey tile in place of the present mixture of colours and pressed tiles. It does not appear that the rafters are defective, but you can never tell

until the roof is uncovered.

Nave Roof: It is obvious that the majority of the laths have perished, or are in course of doing so, for an entirely different reason, i.e., lack of ventilation. This roof was no doubt repaired and reconstructed in 1902, and a splendid job has been made of the timberwork. Before it was slatted in, oak boards were laid on the top of the rafters and the laths nailed on the top of these on to which were nailed stone slates. These latter are not of the usual North Cotswold type, thick and rather uneven, allowing air to get up underneath, but are of the thinner and straighter ("Stonefield Slate") variety which lie very close and tight on top of each other and prevent any air or ventilation reaching the laths. These latter, having no air space behind them, as they are directly fixed on the oak boards, stop ventilation from the underside, and here dry rot has set in.

The only remedy is to take off all the slates, select the thicker and more suitable ones to give ventilation

and make up with new.
