With no intention of eavesdropping one sometimes overhears scraps of conversations that set one thinking. Sometime ago I happened to pass two girls who were evidently having it out heatedly with one another. The retort of one of them reached me and has clung to my mind like a burr ever since. This was it—"And who do you think you are?" That really is a profound question which I commend to your thoughtfulness. It goes down to the roots of life and helps to decide how we live it.

More recently another such fragment of conversation came to my ears as I passed by. It was this—"If only people would keep their word." Yes, if only If only they would keep the word they make to themselves. For example, the resolutions they make in their melting moods of penitence, the things they promise to be and do when they are in a tight corner or when they make a fresh

start. So often such resolves die young.

Or, if only they would keep their word to others, in small matters and in great, what a pleasanter world this would be. As it is, the world is littered with the wreckage of broken obligations, treaties, marriage vows and the like. The foundation of all good fellowship is good faith. That is true of nations, of every kind of community, and of more personal friendships. It is true of the organisations to which you belong. Casual membership isn't the sort of cement to keep them together and strong. By the regularity of your support and by the reliability of your service you keep your word to them.

And if only they would keep their word to God. If only they would honour the pledges they took at their Confirmation for example, why, there would be no empty pews in our Churches, and the great command to "Do this in remembrance of Me" would be one of the

Christian's standing orders.

"If only they would keep their word." That must be a constant sigh of reproach from the heart of God. And we shall only keep our word more faithfully when it is part of our rule of life to keep His word more faithfully.

IN MEMORIAM—DECIMUS AGG

On Friday June 18th Decimus Agg, most faithful son of the Church, passed peacefully to his rest. He will be greatly missed, but the memory of his life and example will long endure. He was one of the most familiar figures in the village and certainly one of the most esteemed. Behind his utter sincerity, his uprightness and his kindliness was a true and profound Christian faith. Badsey Church had no more loyal member. To the end of his long life he was to be found in his place in Church on Sunday mornings, and only ill-health or, during the last year or so, very bad weather kept him away. He was, in fact, on his way to Church on the Sunday before his death but, feeling very unwell, had to return home. Sunday was always to him "a day of worship and rest" and the prevalent disregard of it as such was a matter of deep regret to him with his strong sense of duty and discipline. Such as he are indeed "the salt of the earth." May God grant him rest and give us all grace to follow in the steps of one who was in every way "a good soldier of Christ Jesus" and who in all things strove to "please Him who enrolled Him as a soldier."
