THE EDITOR'S SCRAP BOOK

THE VILLAGE CHURCH

-a Philosopher's Tribute

Prominent in the life of the English Village has been the Church. In the past-though scarcely at all todaythose who earned their living on the land had an affection, an affection which deepened on occasion into reverence, for the Village Church. Hence, when I came to consider again the whole question of religion, it was natural that the process of reconsideration and reflection should take place within the framework of the Anglican Church, and that my worship, when at last I began to worship, should find its appropriate setting in the Parish Church. Indeed I formed the habit of intermittently attending the services of Village Churches long before I came to believe in the truth of what they taught. I would, I used to tell myself, go out of curiosity because I wanted to learn what still went on in them. Or-and perhaps this was nearer the truth-I was attracted by the beauty of the setting and by the beauty of the Liturgy. And both of these did, indeed, have their way with me, calming my spirit and preparing me, albeit unconsciously, for a change of heart, until at last they prevailed, and after the doubts and hesitations I became the diffident and halting Christian that I now am,

I am grateful, more grateful than I can say, to the Church of England and more particularly to its country parishes, and to the men who, in spite of every discouragement, persist in teaching there the Christian religion as the Church understands it. Without them, I should not, I think, have come to Christianity.

One of **b** old said: "Thy gentleness hath made me great." It is what a field of waving corn might say to the sun. For it is the silent ministry of light which makes the harvest possible.

We are apt to think nature is most powerful when she is explosive. We associate power with noise. Yet the raging storm is only an occasional manifestation of a power which is always present. The silent chemistry of nature operates unceasingly, quickening, creating, transforming. Never a moment passes but some touch is given to the earth's beauty, and some addition made to its bounty; but it is done so unobtrusively as to pass unnoticed. Yet this is what makes nature great—the power of gentle-

ness. Not the occasional storm, the earthquake, and the avalanche; but the quiet force that works without pause, as silent and unseen as gravitation, decking the earth in living green, filling the sky with radiant forms.

If we pass to the highest level, we see how this power of gentleness explains the magnetism of the Cross. The crucified Christ draws us with the cords of love. He comes to us "meek and lowly in heart." But meekness is not a synonym for weakness. On the contrary, it is "the power of God unto salvation."

The King of Heaven comes to us without form or comeliness, with neither wealth nor prestige, and with no reliance upon physical force. Yet the more you strip Him of external aids, the more does His moral grandeur shine forth, until at last, when He is stripped bare upon the Cross, He hangs there as the only One who could not be conquered. The divine gentleness made Him great. That weak and apparently futile thing, the Cross, becomes the mightiest moral force in history.

The news of the death of Archdeacon Perowne was received with deep regret by many people in Badsey. He resigned as Archdeacon of Norwich in March last at the age of eighty-five, having held this office for seventeen years. He was a welcome visitor each Christmas when his daughter and son-in-law (Mr. and Mrs. K. G. Johnson) lived at The Manor House, and always offered to help with our Christmas Services. Many will remember with what deep reverence he celebrated Holy Communion

on Christmas morning. On Christmas Eve 1950 he rededicated the bells, after they had been repaired and rehung. In 1952 he was to have distributed the Prizes at the annual Sunday School Service but was unable to do so, owing to illness. This was a disappointment to us all and to him, for he had a deep interest in this Service. Whenever he visited us he took, what he called, his "walks abroad" and delighted to stop and speak to all and sundry, and no one could fail to respond to his courtesy and friendliness. He had given long and distinguished service to the Church, and the "Church Times" described him truly as "a much loved priest who will be remembered as a holy man of God, of genial humour and deep spiritual insight." May he rest in peace.
