### DAY OF PRAYER FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (SUNDAY, OCT. 23rd)

"Education needs teachers, schools, equipment, regulations, machinery. For all these needs the Education Act provides. But education is a spiritual activity. The student learns: but what matters is how he uses his learning, what sort of a person his education makes him to be: and that depends a great deal upon the person from whom he learns and the society (school, home, community) in which he learns and lives. It is the concern of every Christian that in all this spiritual activity of student, teacher, home and community, the grace and guidance of the Holy Spirit should be sought and found." It was a great change for him to live in the country, but he quickly adapted himself to village life and soon became a familiar figure in Badsey. His was a most friendly disposition and he had a cheery greeting for all and sundry. He was generous to a degree, ever ready to give help to a needy cause. He took a great interest in the Men's Fellowship and attended the Meetings regularly until his health failed. He was most patient during his last illness and deeply appreciative of all that was done for him, but he grew very weary towards the last. He passed away peacefully on Sunday, Sept. 4th. Many of us will miss him greatly, but we shall have very happy memories of him.

#### THE SANDYS MONUMENT

The Diocesan Surveyor (Mr. Maurice Jones), after an inspection of the Monument, reported as follows:-

It is evident that there has been a good deal of uneasy movement. Most of the joints of the canopy and cornice have opened out, and the whole of the canopy has gone over to the east. The canopy is supported by bolts taken up through a baulk of timber which rests above and in turn is suspended from the roof truss. The bolts are loose and the iron stay is not under tension. Two of the Purbeck columns have suffered damage. A large piece has been spalled near the head of one column (which may be due to an iron clamp) and another is fractured in a horizontal direction."

(After correspondence with Lord Sandys, the question of the repair of the Monument has been referred to the

Diocesan Advisory Committee).
