WHY WOMEN ARE CHURCHED

One aspect of parish life which intrigues a parish priest, is the varying attitude to childbirth and Churching. In certain parts of the country, girls rarely fail to arrange with the incumbent proper attendance at a Churching service. So great is the zeal of some to make this a post-natal priority that certain young mothers (or more likely the shadow of mother behind them!) would hesitate to cut a loaf of bread until this had been accomplished.

Others spurn anything so elaborate as a pre-arranged Prayer Book Churching service and merely, in secret as it were carry out a sort of ritual "Crossing of the threshold" of the church for a few brief moments—even to the extent of asking a verger for the key to a locked church to enable this to be done! Yet other districts would spurn either custom as an out-dated habit: indeed probably wouldn't even understand what such customs were all about.

Presumably those who are so touchy about the idea of the "un-churched" mother of a newly-born baby playing her normal part in society—cooking, shopping, visiting other houses—infer that the girl concerned is in some way "untouchable" or "unclean." This is a throw-back to sheer primitive religion. Like the Jews of the Old Testament, primitive religions see something "ritually unclean" about childbirth: demanding ritual cleansing before a mother may be accepted back into normal society.

Christianity will have none of this, and sees childbirth and all that is involved in marriage and child-bearing, as one of God's most precious gifts and blessings. Therefore, the Church says that the least you can do after childbirth—even in these days still a thing involving pain and some danger—is to say "Thank you" to God, the Creator of all Life; and to do so without undue delay.

"THE CHURCH IS ALWAYS BEGGING"!!

"It always seems to be a pity that so much time has to be given on these occasions to talking about money," writes the Bishop of Gloucester (Dr. W. M. Askwith) in the Diocesan Gazette in reference to the recent Diocesan Conference.

He adds "It has to be so simply because, under the modern conditions of life, you cannot feed and clothe and shelter people or transport them from place to place without paying for it in money. And if we want to have clergy to preach the Gospel, and teach the Faith, and visit the people; or to have buildings to worship in and

to keep them weathertight; or to fulfil our responsibility to spread our Faith and care for those in need and sorrow or ignorance, it all involves being able to pay the butcher, and the baker, and the candlestick-maker—and all the people on whose work everything we do depends.

"The Church is not out for money at all, but it cannot nowadays do any of its work without it; and so, the money that some of us have to talk about much more often than we should like, and that the rest of us are asked to provide, really constitutes part of the response we have to make to our Lord's commands; it has a spiritual meaning, and our readiness to give it is to some extent a measure of the sincerity of our professions of allegiance to Christ.

"What is really needed is that the present constant begging for money should be made unnecessary by more regular, methodical giving, and an effort on the part of us all to compare what we spend on ourselves with what we give to God's Church."

THE CHURCH CLOCK

At the June Meeting of the Parochial Church Council a letter was read from Mr. C. A. Fifty-three years is a considerable time and we are all quite sure you know every foible and trick that the clock has had. But perhaps it has no tricks and foibles!"

"May I say in all sincerity that your name will always be associated with this clock, and for as long as I can remember, whenever the name of Badsey has been mentioned, someone has been sure to say, 'Ah! that's Mr. Binyon's clock, isn't it?' There is fame for you from an unexpected quarter!"

THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

It is difficult to know what to say with regard to the Patronal Festival and Gift Day (Sunday June 24th). The confusion regarding the 9 a.m. Service was inexplicable in view of the clear wording of the Circular Letter. Some compensation was afforded by the fact that there was a very good congregation at Evensong when the Choir-to whom we owe so much—gave us an inspiring lead. The financial result of Gift Day? Frankly, it was disappointing-only 35 Envelopes returned out of the 105 distributed. It was hoped that the urgency of the work on the roof would call forth a specially generous response from all who use our Church, but it didn't! It would seem that this further expense will fall on the shoulders of the "faithful few"—faithful in their attendance at Church, generous in their response to every appeal. Their gifts, added to what had already been received towards the cost of roof spraying, mean that we have £70 in hand for this work. Our hope is, that since, as it would seem the damage was not so extensive as was feared, the bill, when presented, will shew a reduction on the original estimate. But, in any case, more money will be needed and the members of the Parochial Church Council will have to decide between (a) another "Special Effort" and (b) a raid on the Fabric Fund. The Bishop of Gloucester's remarks (see elsewhere in this issue) are indeed revelant to this matter.

We do not yet know when work on the Sandys Monument will be started.
