"OPERATION FIRM FAITH"

Our Bishop, in "The Diocesan Messenger" writes as follows:—

Throughout the Church of England we are embarking on what is known as "Operation Firm Faith." This title, which I feel is somewhat unfortunate, has been given by the Children's Council, the central body concerned with the religious teaching of our children on Sunday. Let us not be put off by the title but consider the purpose of the effort. What it is seeking to do is to bring before everybody the importance of the spiritual training of the children. At birth every child enters an ordinary family. At baptism the same child enters the greater family of the Church of God. That is what the words, "Received into the congregation of Christ's flock" mean. But if the child is to grow up, he or she must be given the opportunity of learning what the Faith is, and also how to fulfil his Christian duty.

Therefore every child who has been baptised in the Church of England is the concern of all the members. What often happens is that people regard the Church's work for children as either the Vicar's responsibility or that of a few well-disposed people who are prepared to teach in the Sunday School or run a Bible Class. In many parishes the average parishioner couldn't care less, and that is why—let us be quite frank—we lose so many of the children from the Church when they get to the

adolescent age There is another factor which has to be borne in mind, and that is that so many parents, while they are prepared to send their children to Church and Sunday School, and even to allow them to be confirmed, shew little desire themselves to be worshipping members of the Church. It has been said that the average boy and girl see through their parents at the age of seven, and no self-respecting child is going to continue to attend Church and Sunday School when his parents make no effort to go to Church themselves. Unfortunately, it is a common feature of English life to-day that many parents are taking less and less responsibility for their children's welfare. They seem to imagine that now we have a Welfare State, their responsibility ceases. It is therefore important to stress the fact that every child is first a child of God, then the child of his parents, and thirdly the child of the State-in that order, and not in reverse.
"Operation Firm Faith" is a scheme to link home and

Operation Firm Paith' is a scheme to link home and parish, parent, child and congregation, into a unity. On the side of the Church we shall try to have more and more trained and efficient Sunday School teachers and Youth Leaders. On the side of the parents we shall ask for every possible co-operation and encouragement. But there is more than this. In every parish the P.C.C. are pledged as their primary task to do everything they can to further the Kingdom of God. The onus of the care and upbringing of the Church's children must rest firmly and squarely on the shoulders of the P.C.C.s co-operating with and supporting their parish priest. Therefore we shall start the programme in this Diocese with a series of Rallies, in which I myself or Bishop Stuart will address gatherings of Church Councillors. We hope that every Church Councillor will make a point of attending.

After Christmas we shall ask the parishes to discuss and plan and let me know how they propose to follow up this venture in terms of the local community.

What I hope will be the chief result of "Operation Firm Faith" is, that in every Church in the Diocese, the Sunday worship will be the worship of the whole family (father, mother and children) and that this will be accepted as the normal, natural and only Christian way

of doing things. To achieve this will require effort, prayer and the removal of prejudices, but I believe, knowing the Diocese of Worcester, that we shall accept the challenge and not fail.
