A NEW YEAR WISH

May God grant you faith to guide you, courage to support you, His Spirit to cheer you, and may His Blessing rest upon you throughout the year.

During the season of Advent the Church made constant reference to the last judgment, which is something in which we assert our belief every time we say the Creed. We need to keep this doctrine on our minds, for it safeguards two important things. It assures us that God is in control of His universe and that His victory is sure and inescapable. The success of scientists would sometimes obscure such a thought for us. We have to remember that God's victory cannot be complete without the final assessment we know as judgment. The second thing which is safeguarded is our own nature. Without this doctrine, we might forget that we are free beings and that one day each one of us will be judged in accordance with our life and character, and those are things we inevitably mould for ourselves, under God's grace, irrespective of our physical circumstances.

The simple and plain fact is that man cannot know God except by revelation. There is nothing in such a statement which ought to cause the least surprise. None of us knows another human being except in so far as the other reveals himself or "opens his heart." We may know a great deal about another, about his habits, environment, history, and we may make fairly accurate inferences about his character. But it is only in the give and take of friendship that we know him in a fully personal way. That, in every-day language, is what is meant by revelation. God has given Himself to man that man may know Him. All Christian doctrine must rest only on this Revelation of God, and not on human speculation, however subtle and refined.

BAPTISMAL PROMISES

To make promises at baptism and then fail to keep them is a mockery of God, writes the Bishop of Ripon (Dr. G. A. Chase), in the Methley (Yorks.) parish magazine.

He says, "Those who bring a child to be baptised make very solemn promises, that with God's help they will follow up the baptism by training the child to live as God's child. To make those promises and then do nothing to keep them is a very serious matter; it is a mockery of God, and it is terribly unfair to the child. I hope this is brought home by the clergy when people ask for the baptism of their child."

"I think," continues the Bishop, "that if parents are not prepared to do their very best to carry out the duties they have undertaken, it would be more honest of them not to make the promises and to defer the baptism of their child. But, of course, I want parents to bring their children to baptism, to make the promises and to keep them."
