#### THE ORGANISATION OF THE CHURCH

THE PARISH

There is no organisation in the country so well planned and so all-embracing as that of the Church of England, For over 1,000 years the parochial system has divided the whole country into small areas of various sizes called Parishes. There are over 14,000 of these, each with its own incumbent, except in the case of very small parishes where two or three are grouped together. Some of the larger parishes, e.g. Portsea and Yarmouth, have as many as 40,000 inhabitants, while others, in country districts, are so small that there are less than 100 people in them. The tiniest parish is Willersley, Herefordshire, which according to the last complete census had only six inhabitants, and Wilcote in Oxfordshire runs it close with only seven. For obvious reasons each of these is combined with another to make one reasonably-sized parish. Thus it will be seen that no person in the kingdom is beyond the reach of the Church, and everyone is in the care of a Vicar or Rector to whom he can go for help and advice on spiritual and personal matters.

THE RURAL DEANERY

The Parish then, with its own parish priest, is the smallest division, but for purposes of administration and supervision they are grouped into Rural Deaneries, comprising anything from about eight to twenty parishes. One incumbent is chosen, in some cases by the bishop, and in others by his local colleagues, to have oversight of the Rural Deanery, and he is called the Rural Dean.

#### THE RURAL DEAN

The Rural Deam holds an important and responsible position as he is the link between the bishop or archdeacon on the one hand, and the individual clergy of the Rural Deanery on the other.

#### THE ARCHDEACONRY

A number of Rural Deaneries are joined together to form an Archdeaconry. The numbers so joined as a matter of convenience vary in different areas, as do the number of Archdeaconries which form a Diocese, some having two Archdeaconries, some three and some four.

#### THE ARCHDEACON

The Archdeacon has oversight of the Rural Deaneries and parishes in his Archdeaconery. Originally he was the chief Deacon and supervised the charitable and other work of the Deacons. Gradually his importance developed so that today he is the Bishop's chief helper in the administration of the Diocese—the oculus episcopi—or Bishop's Eye. In the Middle Ages he presided over the Archdeacon's Court for the dispensing of justice, but after the Reformation this function passed largely to the ordinary law courts.

The chief work of the Archdeacon today is the inspection of the fabrics and the other properties of the Church. He admits Churchwardens to their office annually and delivers to them a "Charge." He represents the Diocese in Convocation and has, in general, undefined powers of oversight within his Archdeaconry. His appointment is by the Bishop.

#### THE DIOCESE (OR SEE)

The real unit of Church life is the Diocese, which, as we have seen, is divided into Archdeaconries, Rural Deaneries and Parishes. Dioceses vary much in size, c.g. the Diocese of Norwich contains over 700 parishes, while a few, e.g. Worcester, have less than 200. It is the general opinion that

a Diocese of 250 to 300 parishes is the ideal size for efficient organisation.
