THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

During Holy Week everyone should read for himself the Passion narratives from the four Gospels. If you can be at church for Holy Communion, you will hear one whole chapter read in the Gospel for the day. The first half of the St. Matthew Passion is set for the second lesson at Mattins on Palm Sunday. Similarly the first half of the St. John Passion is read at Mattins on Good Friday. At the 8 a.m. service that day, with the Ante-Communion as well, the whole of the St. John Passion is read.

If you cannot be at church each day, read them at home. But not like a novel, with a cigarette in your mouth and your feet on the mantelpiece. Imagine rather that you are on the steps of a throne, receiving a charge from your Sovereign. For your heavenly King is speaking to you from the throne of His Cross. Let the words sink down deeply into your heart, to take root in your life. Then Easter, the spring of souls, will find yours a watered garden, in which are to sprout the blossoms of holiness, bearing fruit in good living.

But let not Hoiy Week pass in a wave of emotional exaltation which breaks when it reaches the shore of normal religious duties, and by Low Sunday has evaporated in foam. Rather let it strengthen the will to make every week a holy week, every Friday a good Friday, every Sunday a day of resurrection to new life in Christ.
