THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

When you have read a good story, you are always glad to hear that the author has written a sequel about the same central character. St. Luke wrote the Acts of the Apostles as a sequel to his Gospel. In the opening sentence he says that his first book related only what Jesus began to do and teach. This is unlike most modern authors of Lives of Christ, who end their story with the Ascension, if not earlier. The Christian believer knows, with St. Luke, that the Life of Jesus has not ended: that His glorified, ascended Life continues for ever in heaven, and on earth in His Body, indwelt by the Holy Spirit; that is, the Church. So Jesus said that His followers would do even greater works than He had done in His restricted life between His Birth and Ascension. This was because He was going into the heavenly world around us, and His promised Spirit would be in them. All this makes us realise that Ascension Day and Whitsunday are very important Festivals indeed. The Christian who treats them as of little account has not begun even to understand what his religion is about. His faith is a dead one. He is living in the past. He has not grasped the fact that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.

If yours is a living faith, you will want to be present at the Lord's Table on Ascension Day and Whitsunday. Please note carefully the times of the services. On Ascension Day these have been adjusted to meet requests from Wickhamford for earlier weekday celebrations.

"Flashback". I should like to thank the people of both parishes for your kind and generous Easter Offerings. I was impressed by the good attendance at the services in Lent and Passiontide.

Our thanks are due to Mr. and Mrs. Bunbury for once again making and providing the palm crosses for both churches, and to Mrs. Marshall for her work at the organ for the special services.

"Forthcoming Attractions". I hope Badsey people are already making things for the **Church Fete** on **June 28th.** Come with your ideas to the preparatory meeting on May 5th, at 8 p.m. in the Parish Room.

Next month I shall write about the Lambeth Conference of Bishops from all over the world. On Saturday, **June 21st**, some of the overseas Bishops will visit Eyesham. Church people of Evesham Rural Deanery will present a **Pageant** and Procession of Witness. I want our two parishes to play a part worthy of our standing in the life of the Deanery.
