THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

By the time this is published we shall have welcomed to the Vale of Evesham a few of the Anglican Bishops assembling in this country for the Lambeth Conference. The Conference itself will take place during the month of July, beginning with big inaugural services in Canterbury Cathedral (July 3rd) and St. Paul's Cathedral (July 6th).

What is this Lambeth Conference?

Ask a friend who is not a churchgoer or is not in the habit of reading church magazines. He or she will probably tell you it is something to do with that Makarios man in Cyprus. You can reply that, with all respect to the reverend prelate, in this instance he is nothing but a red herring. Archbishop Makarios has not been asked to take part in the Conference. As Metropolitan of the Orthodox Church in Cyprus he is simply one of the representatives of non-Anglican Churches who are invited to be present at the formal opening. The personal aspect does not enter into it.

However, even red herrings have their uses.

This one has at least brought the Lambeth Conference into the headlines.

Whether or not the general public becomes Lambeth-conscious, all Church folk should be upholding our Fathers-in-God in their prayers. Nearly 350 Bishops from all parts of the world-wide Anglican Communion will meet to take counsel together. The first Lambeth Conference was in 1867, just before the oldest of the present Backsey inhabitants were born. The most recent was held ten years ago.

We must not expect that the Conference of 1958, any more than its predecessors, will make revolutionary pronouncements or earth-shaking changes. Its resolutions do not legally bind anyone, even the delegates. For the Anglican Communion is in many respects similar to the British Commonwealth of Nations. It is a fellowship of sister Churches, 'independent in their self-government, growing up freely on their own soil and in their own environment as integral parts of the Church Universal" (Report of 1930 Conference). But the Anglican Communion embraces a far wider sphere, even territorially, than the Commonwealth: besides the Churches in the British Isles, the Colonies and the Dominions, there are others, such as the Episcopal Church in the U.S.A., in China, in Korea, and in Japan, and the Anglican Archishopric in Jerusalem.

The Lambeth Conference is a sort of family reunion, in the home of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Lambeth Palace. But the host is not regarded as a sovereign or pope. He is a primate (first among equals). He presides over the Conference, but has no jurisdiction over any province except that of Canterbury. The tone and success of a Lambeth Conference depends more upon the personality of its president than upon the authority residing in his office. The present Archbishop is a man of outstanding gifts and a most genial host, who has already presided successfully over one Lambeth Conference. But he will need all the support our prayers can give.

Most of the work of the Conference is done in its five Committees rather than in full session. The subjects to be considered by the 1958 Conference are as follows:—

- (1) The Holy Bible: its authority and message.
- (2) Church Unity, including the consideration of schemes for reunion proposed for Ceylon and North India.
- (3) Progress in the Anglican Communion including (a) the contemporary missionary appeal and means of advance; (b) principles of revision of the Book of Common Prayer, including the Church Calendar and the recognition of local saints and servants of God; (c) ministries and man-power.
- (4) The reconciling of conflicts between and within nations.
- (5) The family in modern society.

At the end of each Conference, the Bishops sum up their conclusions in an Encyclical Letter, which is published to the world. The decisions of the Lambeth Conference, though not legally binding on anybody, have great moral weight and spiritual authority. Who can doubt that after so much prayer, study and common counsel, the deliberations of the Church's consecrated leaders are inspired by the Holy Spirit? The Bishops can say with confidence, like the Apostles and Elders of the Church when they issued their decree after the Council of Jerusalem recorded in Acts XV, "It seemed good to the Holy Ghost and to us"

Before the 1948 Conference our late Bishop, Dr. Cash, wrote, "Each Lambeth Conference is not an end in itself, it is a stage in a process". When Archbishop Longley summoned the first Conference in 1867, at the request of the Provincial Synod of the Church of Canada, only 76 bishops were present. The problems before them were quite different in their setting from those of 1958. Each of the eight Conferences since then has marked a stage in the progress of the Anglican Communion towards greater cohesion and understanding of its mission in the world.

Each Lambeth Conference stimulates the pulses of the whole Anglican Communion. Perhaps in the Providence of God a really great awakening is designed to follow Lambeth 1958. Who knows? If we follow the apostolic precept to "pray without ceasing", history will be made, "not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts".
