THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 11th. I suggest we each ask ourselves the following questions, and if the answer is negative (which it surely must be), try to remedy the situation by positive action in a simple Lent rule.

Prayer. Do I spend any real time in the company of my Father, who loves me with an everlasting love? Or do I give Him a few spare moments occasionally for a formal interview? I will pray every morning and evening (on my knees, not in

bed), and say grace before meals.

Holy Communion. Am I carrying out my Elder Brother's dying request: 'Do this in remembrance of Me'? Or do I think I am strong enough without the spiritual Food He offers? If a monthly communicant, I will now come weekly (or at least

fortnightly).

Reading. Am I listening to what the Holy Spirit is saying to me in my heart? Do I draw my mind aside from the hubbub of worldly thoughts to let His voice be heard? I will read the Bible daily, join the Bible Reading Fellowship, and read some book on the Christian faith or life during Lent.

Penitence. Am I really sorry for grieving the loving heart of God by my sins, and crucifying the Son of God afresh? Every evening I will examine myself and confess my sins of the past day.

Giving. Am I being a true follower of Him who gave up the riches of heaven to become poor for my sake? Is my giving to His Church in right proportion to what I spend on myself? I will plan my giving on a regular weekly basis, as a due from me to God.

Self-Discipline. Do I ever say 'no' to the cravings of self? Am I fitting myself to be a useful soldier and servant of the Son of Man who had nowhere to lay His head? I will give up some luxury or 'weakness' in Lent, especially practising self-denial on Fridays.

May you have an adventurous, inspiring, and
