THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

I should like to thank you very warmly for your Easter Offering.

Easter again showed a fall in the number of communicants at Badsey, and a further slight increase at Wickhamford. Both churches were beautifully decorated. Once again our thanks are due to Mr. and Mrs. Bunbury for the crosses on Palm Sunday. Those who came to the Wednesday evening services in Lent were greatly helped by the Rev. T. P. Hearn's thoughtful devotional talks, and we are thankful also to Canon Charles-Jones for coming to conduct "the Watch by the Cross" on Good Friday. Mr. P. Rayner, lay reader, was of great assistance in the administration of Holy Communion on Easter Day.

The Confirmation on April 15th was a most inspiring and happy occasion. The Bishop spoke wisely and understandingly in his simple friendly way; the arrangements went smoothly and impressively, thanks to the churchwardens, sidesmen, clerk, choir and organist, and the ringers. The ladies of the two P.C.C.s provided a wonderful reception at the Remembrance Hall afterwards. Many thanks also to Mrs. Harvey and Mrs. Brady for helping the candidates to veil before the service, to the Misses Sladden for lending their house for this, and to Mr. and Mrs. B. Brazier for letting the choir robe at theirs.

This month we celebrate the glorious festivals of Ascension and Whitsun. Ours is one of the very few Christian countries in which Ascension Day is not a public holiday. That need not prevent Church people from honouring the day in the proper manner: there are early celebrations of Holy Communion. Some years ago the usual time in Badsey Church for the earliest Ascension Day service was 5-0 a.m. Surely 6-30 is not too early on a summer morning for Christian disciples to "hail the day that sees Him rise"!

Last month we reported the decision at the Badsey Annual Church Meeting to have one Sunday evening celebration of Holy Communion each month. This will be on the fourth Sunday instead of the midday celebration which has been usual on that Sunday. The first will be on Trinity Sunday, May 24th, and will follow choral Evensong (the office only, to the end of the Collects). I made this suggestion of evening Communion only after considerable heart-searching. It is contrary to the traditions in which I myself have been brought up. But we must face the facts. The Lord's own service which He gave us ought to be the chief service on a Sunday in a Christian church. In

Badsey only a handful of people attend church in the morning compared with the large congregations which come in the evening. No amount of exhortation from me is going to alter your Sunday habits! My one concern is that the Lord's Table should be honoured, never mind what time of the day. Many of us prefer the early morning, when the day is fresh, so that we can offer our vows to God as our first act of the week. But I do recognise that there are some who need longer rest on Sunday mornings, and others, such as busy housewives, who find it difficult to come later in the morning. Some find that they can give their minds more readily to devotion when the main domestic concerns of the day are finished.

One thing is important. Those who are going to receive Communion in the evening should not be less careful in their preparation. I hope too that you will try to keep a fast of at least 3 hours before receiving. This can easily be done if you have tea a bit earlier on that Sunday.
