THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

A suggestion was made at Wickhamford P.C.C. recently that members of the congregation should be allowed to submit favourite hymns for inclusion in the services. During this second half of the Christian year, I shall be pleased to accede to this request, for both churches. I cannot however guarantee to include a hymn on any particular Sunday. I select the hymns a month in advance, and on a systematic basis. But I promise you that your hymn will be included as soon as possible, unless we have only just had it!

I have an idea that many people picture their vicar, when he has to choose the hymns, jotting down a few numbers at random, like taking lottery tickets out of a hat. I can assure you it is not like that at all. It needs quite careful thought, and to select the hymns for two churches for one month usually takes three or four hours of my time.

Perhaps you would be interested to know some of the things that have to be considered. Here they are:—

- (1) There must be a fair proportion in each service of the old favourites and the not so familiar. On the one hand there is the man who said "If you want to know why I've stopped coming to church, Rector, it's because whenever I've been you've had the same hymns time after time". 'Hardly surprising, George', was the reply, "since the only time you used to come was the harvest festival". On the other hand there is the lady who said, "Why do we have so many new hymns? You have to keep thinking all the time what you are singing". Thinking is not a bad exercise, and for that reason alone it is good to sing sometimes an unfamiliar hymn. The most popular hymns are not always the most edifying or enlightening. Besides, variety is the spice of life. You would soon complain if you were served with an unchanging diet of one person's favourite hymns—the Vicar's for instance.
- (2) Choice is limited to some extent by the particular hymnal in use. The laws of copyright make it inevitable that no one hymn book can contain all the finest hymns. Also our own book (the old A. & M. unrevised) was last re-edited in 1916. Many hymns which have become popular through broadcasting cannot be sung by us in church. Within these limits one tries to provide variety throughout the year, without too much repetition. I try not to put down the same hymn more than twice in six months. If it was sung last in the evening, next time it must be in the morning, and vice versa.
- (3) At least one hymn in each service is chosen in relation to the Collect or Lessons (or Epistle or Gospel) for the day. There may also be other special factors, such as a collection for overseas missions.

- (4) There must be a due proportion between 'corporate' and 'subjective' hymns. A subjective hymn is one which dwells on the relationship between God and the individual soul, and with the effect of divine action on the inward emotions and conflicts of the individual. It generally uses the first person singular throughout. A corporate hymn is concerned with God's objective acts of Creation. Redemption and Sanctification for the whole human race, and with the operation of divine grace in the Church rather than in the individual. Compare 'Jesu, Lover of my soul' with 'Praise to the holiest in the height'. To have too many corporate hymns makes the worship seem unreal to the individual and unconcerned with his daily needs and aspirations. On the other hand, to have too many subjective hymns makes the worship sentimental and mawkish. Unfortunately our predominantly 19th century hymn-books contain an overwhelming proportion of the subjective type. They rarely express present-day modes of thought and feeling.
- (5) Another classification of hymns has also to be taken into account. There are Hymns of Praise, (e.g. 'Holy, Holy, Holy'), Hymns of Aspiration (e.g. 'O for a closer walk with God'), Hymns of Supplication (e.g. 'Lead us, heavenly Father, lead us'), and Hymns of Dedication (e.g. 'Soldiers of Christ, arise'. Each of these elements should have its due place in every service.
- (6) Hymns differ a good deal in length and in metre. Care has to be taken that not too many hymns in one service are long ones or have eightline verses.

Add to all this the fact that with two churches I do not want to sing the same hymns twice over the same morning or evening.

So you see, choosing the hymns is like doing a rather complicated puzzle. I know only one mental exercise more difficult, and that is working out a school time-table. But I am not offering the job to anyone else. And I don't mind receiving complaints as to how it is done. In fact, I most heartily sympathise. I was once a layman myself.
