THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

Christopher Columbus! His name is used as an expletive. No wonder, for we of the old world often question whether he was really the great benefactor of the human race that he is sometimes made out to be. In the middle of the twentieth century, our life and culture in this island are so permeated by American influence that it is hard to pick out any original English elements which have been untouched by it.

Some things that come to us from across the Atlantic are distinctly not an improvement on our former native ways. But there are others which are very good indeed. One such is the movement for Christian Stewardship.

About ten years ago, English churchpeople returning from visits to Canada and the States were beginning rather wistfully to contrast the standard of giving in English parishes with what they had seen in American church life. It began to be realised that it had nothing to do with the U.S.A. and Canada being richer countries than ours. The high standard of giving among transatlantic Christians was due to an entirely different attitude to wealth. In the words of a recent booklet which has been sent to all English parishes by our Central Board of Finance: "The Christian stewardship of money is part of a larger stewardship of time. talents, possessions and opportunity. In this materialistic and acquisitive age, a right attitude towards the gaining and the use of money could be a distinctive mark of Christian men and women and a particularly effective form of witness to Christ who is the Lord of all life."

The Stewardship movement is now sweeping through the Church of England like an invigorating wind. It is one of the most significant things in the story of our Church in the 20th century. Through it the Holy Spirit is speaking to us in our generation.

There is one big danger we have to avoid. If a person knows nothing of the art of cookery, it is no good his trying out the most complicated recipes from a book, when he hasn't the faintest idea how to boil an egg. In the same way, it is no use our adopting the particular methods of applying the principles of stewardship that have been worked out in America, without first grasping the underlying doctrine. It is not a new doctrine, for it is part of the Gospel of Christ, but it has to be re-discovered and re-learnt in the Church of England. Our own Bishop has very wisely suggested that in this Diocese we should not immediately launch out into all sorts of schemes of parochial finance ("Every-Member-Canvass", "Share Scheme", etc.), but should first try to bring home to all parishioners the principles of Christian Stewardship.

To quote again the booklet mentioned above: "The primary objective is not to inculcate the duty of giving one-fortieth, one-twentieth or one tenth of income, but to teach the stewardship of tentenths. If Christian stewardship is taught merely as a means of raising money for the Church, it will fail. If it is taught with single-minded emphasis upon the accountability of the faithful steward of God for the right use of all with which God has entrusted him, the needs of the Church will look after themselves."

There will be much more on this subject in later issues of this magazine. Our voyage of discovery has only just begun. Christopher Columbus thought he was going to find India, but instead he stumbled on a vast new Continent. Who knows that in our exploration of Christian Stewardship we may not be led to horizons wider than we had dreamed of?
