#### THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

General Election campaigns are much tamer affairs than they used to be. We may welcome the lack of vituperation and mud-slinging, vet question whether it is altogether a good sign. When nobody expresses strong feelings about politics, it generally betokens the lack of strong convictions. This is a dangerous situation in a parliamentary democracy. The general public shows a growing apathy towards political matters, for which M.P.s themselves are largely to blame through their slavery to the party machine. The personality and reputation of local candidates count for so little in these days, and now the TV has robbed them of what small part was left to them in contributing to their own success or failure at the polls.

The influence of television on the General Election need not however be deplored, it by this medium people are awakened to the things that really matter in politics. There is far too much appeal by all the parties to the material self-interest of the electors. They vie with each other in offering more and better social benefits. The great principles concerning our relations with other countries, the well-being of the peoples in our colonies, the use of our resources to help the poor and needy of other lands, the provision of a sound education through which our children shall learn how to differentiate between good and bad, true and false, and to live as human beings in God's world—these are the real questions the electors ought to be showing concern about. Before we cast our vote on October 8th, as it our duty to do, let us each consider who is the most likely to give us wise and strong leadership on the great issues. rather than who will do most to line our own pockets.

Spiritual Advance Campaign. At the Diocesan Conference in June, the Bishop gave the outlines of this scheme, in which he is calling all churchpeople of Worcestershire to join him. From the Diocesan "Workshop", the campaign will be worked out at Rural Deanery level, and the 3rd Workshop will be in each parish (or group of parishes). The Bishop writes: "The Spiritual Campaign aims at bringing new life and vigour into the parish so that it may exercise to the full its influence for Christ in the world, and carry its message of joy and comfort to every family within its boundaries. It is also a practical and useful opportunity for laymen and women to act in His service in a manner which... provides an example and inspiration to all who seek to further God's work in the world against evil".

On Monday evening, 12th October, in the Walker Hall, Evesham, there will be a Deanery meeting at which the Rev. A. Woods, who has been asked by the Bishop to direct the Campaign. and Mr. Charlton Edwards, will speak. Attendance will not be confined to Ruridecanal Conference members, and it is hoped a good number of layfolk from our two parishes will come to hear the first rounds being fired in the Campaign.

Christian Stewardship. Our thought for the month: "Parish finance should be based not upon appeals for the needs of the Church, but upon the recognition of the personal duty to allocate for the work of His Church a worthy proportion of the income with which God has entrusted each one of us, as an act of worship, in obedience, in gratitude, and in love".
