THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

My heart is still very full of thankfulness for the splendid response which the people of both parishes have made recently to appeals to direct giving: Badsey Church Gift Day £232; Wickhamford Harvest Collections for the Refugees, £28. It is in this way that we realise most deeply our oneness in Christ, for it is His own way. We read in the Acts of the Apostles that they that believed "were of one heart and of one soul: neither said any of them that ought of the things which he possessed was his own". The individual members. of Christ gladly laid their possessions at the apostles' feet. They didn't just talk about 'fellowship. They practised it by real sharing, which is what the word 'communion' means. Each acknowledged that whatever he had did not belong to him; he was only a trustee. It belonged to God.

The Happy People

The converting power of the early Church was largely due to this demonstration of real fellowship in the Spirit through sacrifice. People naturally asked what it was that made Christians such happy people. They did not need to be told the answer. They could see it. The Christians were showing the truth of their Lord's own words, "It is more blessed to give than to receive". So the Christian Gospel swept over the languid, selfish pagan world like a fresh sea-breeze.

The Church cannot hope to influence the dreary wealth-obsessed society of today except through showing the attractiveness and power of sacrifice. It is when we give freely, without expecting 'a return for our money', that we are being most like our Master. It is when we give together, in corporate fellowship, that we know ourselves to be the Family of God.

Surprised?

The response was all the more encouraging when it is remembered that this is a time of considerable hardship and loss in the staple industry of our district. Yet we ought not to be surprised at the result. Why not? The answer is in one word: Prayer. For months we have been preparing for this effort by prayer. If we believe that God answers prayer, we have no right to be surprised.

The Power Supply

There are some forty members of the Prayer Guild in the two parishes. Every month they receive an intercession leaflet with a different prayer and a list of special objects for which to pray, and the names of the sick. Wonderful things are happening in these two parishes as a result of their prayers. It is a tremendously important piece of work, and it helps you in your prayer times when you know you are not alone, but one of a group of fellow-Christians using the same prayers and praying for the same objects. I shall be very happy to

have new members. The subscription is 1/- a year, to cover costs of paper and duplicating.

The Parson's Nose

I mentioned just now the sick folk. If I have one general grouse at the moment against you good people, it is that I am not kept properly informed when parishioners have been taken ill. This is not only a hindrance to my duty of visiting the sick, but is doing the sick person a disservice by withholding from him unnecessarily the prayers and ministrations of the Church. "Oh! hadn't vou heard?" the relatives will say to me when at length it has come to my knowledge through devious routes, "thought you were bound to know, Vicar". That's just it. Because everybody thinks I am sure to know already, nobody tells me. Some of you are. very good in letting me know, but these are exceptions. Don't be afraid of telling me what I am sure to know. I am pretty sure not to. My nose is not as long, nor my ears as flapping, as some people seem to think.
