# BADSEY AND ALDINGTON NOTES THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

Xmas or Christmas. Does it matter?

It used not to matter a scrap. To past generations X or Xt was a recognised way of abbreviating the name 'Christ' when writing in note form. (I use it in my own sermon notes). Instructed Xians knew what they were doing when they wrote Xmas. They would have thought it very rude however to send a printed greeting to a friend: "A merry Xmas". It would be like wishing them "A happy B'day". Yet today many people even pronounce the Festival of Christ's Nativity as "Exmas".

But does it matter?

It does. Leaving Christ's Name out of Christmas is a symptom of the growing paganism of English people. 'Xmas' has become a symbol of the secular, commercialised beano which is all that Christmas means to most people now. No doubt you have heard the story of the person in the stationer's shop, who seeing a certain kind of greeting card displayed, remarked "Good heavens, they're bringing religion into Christmas now!"

All Christians have a duty to help in bringing Christ back into Christmas.

How is it to be done? There are several ways.

- 1. For you it must always be Christmas. Never Xmas.
- 2. Send your friends really Christian Christmas cards. This is the best way of reminding people what Christmas is about—not just your friends (who may not need reminding), but the people who will see the cards displayed in their homes. It is very difficult to get 'religious' Christmas cards in the average local stationer's. What few they have are usually tasteless and cost the earth. The church publishers like S.P.C.K. and Mowbray's have beautiful cards at 2d or 3d each as well as more expensive ones. Unfortunately you cannot get them easily without a journey to Worcester or Oxford. For that reason I have bought a large stock of such cards, which we have already had on sale at M.U. meetings, and will be available at church after Sunday services.
- 3. Remembering the poor stable at Bethlehem, and the boundless love which is shed from it, let Christmas be a real opportunity for you to reflect some of that love in sacrificial giving. Do not just think of it as a time to buy expensive presents for people who don't really need them. It is Christ's Birthday, not theirs. We can give to Christ Himself, as He has told us, by serving the needs of His suffering brothers and sisters. Badsey people, you will be asked this Christmas to play your part in the World Refugee Year. (See notice below). Wickhamford people, you did this at

Harvest; at Christmas you will make your annual gift to the Church of England Children's Society. In either case, bring Christ into Christmas by making your chief, and most costly, offering to Him.

4. Do not spoil the wonderful season of Advent by complete absorption in the business of 'Xmas' preparations. I make no apology for being a bit curt with people who start reminding me somewhere about October that "Christmas will soon be here", as if there were nothing else to do or think about in the meantime. A children's hymn on the Christian year begins with the line

"Advent tells us Christ is near", and that surely is the message of Advent which makes it for Christians a season of joyful yet dread expectancy. It tells us, not that Christmas is near, but that Christ is near. Are we ready for Him, our Lord and Judge? Shall we be able to look Him in the face?

The sermons on the four Sunday evenings in Advent at both churches will be on the Four Last Things: Death, Judgement, Hell and Heaven.

5. In the festivities, do not miss the Feast. Do not disappoint your Host, who is God Himself. by staying outside, having surfeited yourself with the attractively displayed but quite worthless husks from Mammon's table. Join your fellow-Christians in worship on the day of Christ's Mass. Make sure that you bring the children to church. Christ's Birthday with Christ left out! That is unthinkable for any Christian child. "Oh, but there are Christmas services on TV and sound radio." Indeed there are—for invalids, and for people who are not committed Christians. If you come into either of these categories, the radio services will suffice for you. For able-bodied servants of our King, the invitation is not "O sit round and adore Him", but "O come, all ye faithful".

So, having made sure that Christ is going to be in the heart of **your** Christmas, you will know the deep peace and blessed joy (which Mrs. Braby joins me in wishing you all) of

Refugee Appeal. The Christmas collections will be for the Inter-Church Aid & Refugee Service. This will be Badsey's contribution to the World Refugee Year. The Vicar will gladly receive contributions from any who will be away at. Christmas or unable to be in church. Badsey has a good record for assisting refugees in the past. In 1658 we gave £1-6-5 for the relief of Protestant refugees from Poland and Bohemia, in 1670 and 1680 £1-8-5 and £1-10-2 for the redemption of Turkish captives and captives in Africa, and in 1686 for French Huguenot refugees £1-8-0. For values in present-day money, multiply by at least 20, and remember that the total population of Badsey and Aldington was then about 270. In 1956 we gave £33-12-6 tor Hungarian refugees. That was an appeal to meet an immediate need. This time we are asked to do something towards the problem on a worldwide scale, concerned not only with the many displaced persons still in Europe, but the Palestinian Arabs and the Chinese refugees in Hong Kong.

Not only was the Son of God born in a stable. The Holy Family became refugees soon after His Birth. You have the inestimable privilege of ministering to Him in the persons of His distressed brothers and sisters today.
