THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

I am now able to tell you of the plans made in Evesham Rural Deanery to carry out the first stage of the Bishop's Campaign for Spiritual Advance. As we have now been given two years instead of one, it was felt that we should not straight away launch visiting campaigns in the parishes. Instead the clergy would first help the laity to equip themselves for evangelism—to meet the opportunities for witness that occur in daily life. So the idea is that the first half of 1960 should be a period of training, which would consist of two courses in each parish:—

- (a) Theoretical. Sunday sermons from Epiphany to Easter with the general title, "What a Christian believes", and from Easter to Trinity on "The Meaning of Church Membership".
- (b) Practical. On weekday evenings in Lent, an informal course, preferably not in church, on how to answer questions and deal with situations which call for Christian witness.

In addition there are two Deanery events arranged for devotional training, the Quiet Afternoon in April and the Retreat in May (see below). Without prayer all our plans come to nought.

On Monday evening, 25th January (Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul), a meeting of church-people of the Rural Deanery will be held at the Walker Hall, at 7 p.m. At this meeting the scheme outlined above will be presented, and we shall be addressed by Mrs. Charles-Edwards, the Bishop's wife, who is a most inspiring speaker in her own right. It is hoped that Parochial Church Councillors and any others interested will do their best to attend.

At a meeting in the early autumn, the first stage of the Campaign will be summed up, and the next stage planned.

In our own two parishes the Sunday evening sermons for January, in the course, "What a Christian believes", will be as follows:—

- Jan. 3 Do Creeds matter?
 - . 10 I believe in God the Father.
 - " 17 God the Almighty.
 - ,, 31 God who has made me and all the world.

Please remember the whole of the Campaign for Spiritual Advance in your prayers.

Can you hear God?

The Vicar will gladly receive names for either or both of these events. It is advisable to book as early as possible.
