THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

Onward, Christian soldiers!

This will be the marching song of a procession of Christ's followers of all ages in a demonstration on Good Friday.

Where is this public demonstration? Trafalgar Square?

No. The streets of Badsey.

There will be seen, as in the procession to Calvary on the first Good Friday, "the cross of Jesus going on before". A rough hewn cross, ten feet high, such as our Master carried and died upon, will be borne at the head of this procession by three men—an Anglican, a Methodist and a member of Badsey Chapel (Friends). This will be a visual demonstration of our oneness in Christ.

At 6-0 p.m. the procession will leave the parish church by the lych-gate, and go along Chapel Street and round by School Lane into High Street, then up to the Pike. On the piece of ground in front of the Remembrance Hall the cross will be set up, and we shall gather round it and hold a short service lasting 15 to 20 minutes. If it is wet, the service will be held inside the Hall.

On this day, so sacred to all Christian people, we who meet in different places of worship at other times and have inherited different traditions, will stand together at the foot of the Cross and proclaim the universal Saviour. Jesus said, "I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto Me".

Will you be there? Most of you were marked with the cross in Baptism, that you should "not be ashamed to confess the faith of Christ crucified". It is not a very hard thing you are being asked to do—to join with your fellow-Christians in that procession; or, if you do not feel yourself to be a fully-committed Christian, just to be at the service.

Those who will join in the procession are asked to be at the church not later than 5-50. We shall pray together before we start out.

The arrangement of this special service will necessitate a few alterations to our usual Good Friday programme. Badsey children's service will be at 10-0 as usual. At Wickhamford there will be no evening service, but there will be a simple service for adults and children at 10-45 a.m. (It cannot be later, because I have to be at All Saints, Evesham at 12-0 to conduct the 3 Hours' Service). There will be the usual one hour's "Watch by the Cross" at Badsey from 2-0 to 3-0., conducted this year by the Rev. D. T. Russell, Vicar of the Littletons.

On Easter Day, as there will be Holy Baptism at Badsey, there will not be a service for children at Wickhamford in the afternoon. Parents are

encouraged to bring their children to Evensong at 5-30. Badsey children likewise will have no special service, but should come to the Sung Eucharist at 11-0 or to Evensong.

The course of sermons at Evensong on the Creed finishes on Easter Day. From Low Sunday until Trinity Sunday there will be a course on the Sacraments.

I hope that all will use the great opportunities of Passiontide and Easter to draw nearer to our blessed Lord, and to dedicate their lives afresh to His service.

Annual Vestry and Parochial Church Meeting 24th February, 1960.

In the Vestry Meeting, Mr. E. Cooke was re-elected Vicar's Warden and Mr. J. E. Parry People's Warden. The Vicar said the parish was fortunate in having as its chief officers, two such men who really did love their church.

In the A.P.C.M. Mrs. E. Cooke (Hon. Sec.) presented the revised Electoral Roll, containing 149 names. In her report on the proceedings of the P.C.C., she mentioned the Parish socials and the joint reception with Badsey P.C.C. after the Confirmation. Mrs. T. H. Collett (Hon. Treas.) presented the accounts for 1959, showing balances of £124 in the General Fund and £266 in the Fabric Fund. 26 per cent. of the year's expenditure was given to objects outside the parish.

Mr. Cooke, reporting on the fabric of the church, stated that although no serious structural defects were apparent,

an architect's inspection would be necessary this year, as the last was in 1955.

The Vicar, after acknowledging the good work done by church officers and workers in the past year, gave his report. It had been another year of advance. Communicants, which had showed a record figure of 693 in 1958, had increased further in 1959 to 763. Eleven candidates had been confirmed and most of the younger ones were still regular at Communion: they had the encouragement of communicant parents.

Miss A. L. Cox reported on the work of the Sunday School, and Mr. Parry on the new heating system which is to be installed in the church.
