THE VICAR'S LETTER SOLD DEGLES

My dear People, and the minumum

Mrs. Braby and I are most grateful for the kindness shown by people in both parishes in the generous Easter Offering.

Both churches were beautifully decorated for Easter. The Easter Garden arranged by Miss N. E. Smith with the assistance of her pupils was particularly lovely this year. Communicant figures were slightly up on last year in Badsey, slightly down in Wickhamford. Even allowing for some people being away, the attendances were nothing like what they should and could have been. It was disappointing to notice that several young people have already forgotten the vows they made so solemnly at their Confirmation only a year ago.

A new course of Confirmation classes will be starting in the autumn. To avoid misunderstanding later, let me make it quite clear now that the policy, announced at the annual church meetings will be followed. I shall not prepare any candidates for confirmation below the age of 17, unless their parents are communicants (or candidates) who are regularly coming with them to church (not just sending them). Twenty-two years' experience of preparing confirmation candidates has taught me that it is wrong to present young adolescents or children for confirmation unless they are being encouraged by their parents' example (as well as precept). Badsey and Wickhamford are not different from other parishes in this respect. It is also the expressed wish of our Bishop that young candidates should not be presented to him under such conditions. When a person offers himself for confirmation at a more mature age, he can be expected not only to understand the nature of the vows he will make, but to be able to stand on his own feet. But even at 17 or over, he must show that he is in earnest by coming regularly to church.

Spiritual Advance Campaign. Some 300 of you now have one of the cards with the special prayer which the Bishop has asked us to use daily. Ask me for a card if you haven't one. There were good attendances from both parishes at the series of Wednesday evening meetings in Lent for intercession and discussion of questions on Christian faith and practice. These meetings, together with the Sunday evening sermons on the Creed (being followed now by a course on the Sacraments), were designed to train members of the Church in using opportunities of witness. This period of preliminary training ended with a simple act of witness on Good Friday, when we were able to join with our fellow-Christians of other traditions in a demonstration of loyalty to Christ crucified. The response was heartening. Perhaps it was a good thing that it rained at the time of our openair procession and service (the only bit of rain in the whole Easter period!), for this provided a further test of our showing we really meant business. People stood up to the test very well. When I asked whether we should go into the Hall for the service, you said, "No, we'll stay outside". That shows spirit (or rather, the Spirit.)

Let us show a like devotion to our Lord on Ascension Day (May 26th). It was on that day that He told His disciples they were to be witnesses to Him, and that they would receive power to do it.

The following week-end there will be the Retreat for laymen and women at Cropthorne (see notice below). I hope several of you will avail yourselves of this great opportunity for receiving spiritual power.

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RETREAT TO ADVANCE.

This is not quite so crazy as it sounds.

A retreat is often necessary to consolidate forces for a big advance. The greatest Campaign for Spiritual Advance ever undertaken was when Our Lord "returned in the power of the Spirit into Galilee" to begin His ministry, after a retreat of forty days in the wilderness.

For our own spiritual campaign in Evesham Deanery we are not arranging forty days in the wilderness, but forty-eight hours in the delightful atmosphere of the Old House, Cropthorne—with its beautiful garden and restful chapel, where the spiritual batteries can be re-charged as the still small voice of God is heard.

The Retreat is for laymen and women, and will begin at supper time on Friday, 27th May, and continue till tea-time on Sunday the 29th. The conductor will be the Prior of Alton Abbey, Hants. He knows well the problems of men and women living in the world, having been a newspaper man before he became a monk. The conductor gives two or three helpful talks in the chapel each day, and the rest of the time you spend either meditating in the chapel, strolling in the garden, walking in the countryside, or reading in the comfortable lounge. The Vicar will be glad to tell you more about it.

The cost of the Retreat for those who can be there the whole time is 35/-. It is quite all right to join the retreat on Saturday if you cannot get away on Friday evening, in which case adjustments are made in the charges, e.g. Saturday afternoon to Sunday afternoon 21/-. If you would like to come please let the Vicar know before the 18th May.

Albert Crane was one of the fine old characters of Badsey. Of late years he had been blind and ailing, and used to receive Holy Communion at home. He was one of the few left among us who could describe Badsey Church before the restoration of 1885, being a member of the mixed choir formed by the Rev. T. H. Hunt at that time to sing in the restored chancel, the gallery having been pulled down. He was always enthusiastic about the achievements of Badsey Choir. This choir used to sing at Wickhamford on alternate Sundays. Albert gave up going there when he got into trouble because Ernest Mustoe stuck a pin into him! He started work at Aldington at the age of 11, and received 10/- a month. He was a very hard worker all his life. In the sports held on the Green for Queen Victoria's Jubilee (1887), he won seven 1st prizes. Later, as a man, he was to know much sadness. After a fine record of active service in the Great War, at a later age than most volunteers, he lost his wife in the great 'flu epidemic. He was a very lovable old man. Our sincere sympathy to all the members of his family.

Mrs. Annie Stribblehill, who lived with her sister-in-law in the High Street, was not very well-known in the village. as she did not go out because of her advanced age. She too received the Sacrament at home. She was a quiet, gentle person whom it was a privilege to know. later. let me make it quit
