### THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

"Lord, thou knowest that I must be busy this day. If I forget thee, do not thou forget me".

This prayer is said to have been uttered by a royalist commander before the battle of Edgehill, the first engagement of the English Civil War. Some people find it a rather shocking prayer. They say we ought not to excuse ourselves in a prayer for forgetting God; and, as it is unthinkable that God should forget us, why ask Him not to do what He would not do anyway? Personally I think it is a very sensible prayer. It is unrealistic to pretend that we shall be consciously thinking of God every moment of the day. God does not expect it of us: he has work for us to do which will demand our complete concentration. What we can do is to dedicate the whole day to Him at the start, and in addition make acts of recollection of God's presence at certain times, especially before beginning some new activity. The request that God will not forget us is a reminder to ourselves that we are always in God's loving hand.

"Let me evermore abide Hidden in thy wounded side".

At least the prayer of recollection helps to keep the thought of God's nearness in the back of our minds all the time, so that we can bring that thought to the forefront of our minds at any time.

We may not, like that old cavalier, have a battle in front of us today. But we may, for instance, have a motor journey, almost as dangerous to life and limb as an old-time battle. What a difference it would make if every traveller by road who professed belief in God were to set out with a prayer on his lips! A driver having said his prayer, would then concentrate all his powers on the job in hand, knowing that God was not forgetting him. Here is a prayer which a parishioner has shown me; some of you may know it already. Perhaps it is a bit long to use on every occasion, but it has some suggestive thoughts which one might have in mind as one utters a brief prayer on inserting the ignition key.

#### THE MOTORIST'S PRAYER

Grant me a steady hand, a watchful eye
That none may suffer hurt when I pass by.
Thou givest life, I pray no act of mine
May take away or mar that gift of thiue.
Shield those, dear Lord who bear me company
From foolish folk and all calamity.
Teach me to use my car for others' need,
Nor miss through lack of wit or love of speed
The beauties of thy world, that thus I may
With joy and courtesy go on my way.

Try to say a little prayer of dedication to God before starting a piece of work, or visiting a friend, or writing a letter. It is rather like applying the principle of Grace before Meat to other activities as well. But how many of you do say Grace before a meal?

It is almost unthinkable that any Christian family should sit down to a meal without first thanking the Giver of all good. Yet it is a sad fact that in very few homes nowadays is Grace said. When I ask Sunday School children what graces they know, they can only repeat to me the ones they have at school, because Grace is not said in their homes. Is not this a shameful thing? At the Mothering Sunday services in 1959 I gave each family a card with a simple grace on it. From what I can gather, it has made not the slightest difference to anybody.

If we profess to believe that God is our Father, the least we can do is to acknowledge Him when we partake of His bounties. Yet children are growing up in Christian homes without even this simple recognition of His presence. How can the Church hope to hold back the gathering forces of paganism in our world, when the very existence of God is ignored at home by those who worship Him in church? If you do not have Grace said in your home, I implore you, loving God as you really do, to start immediately. It is a simple custom, but of immense influence for good.

## The Organ

It is almost unthinhable that any Christian

For many years now there has been a fund for the purchase of a new organ. Year by year money has been put in reserve for this purpose from church fetes, gift days and ordinary income. At last the object of all this effort is to be realised. A purchaser has been found for the old organ, for which we are to receive £200, and a Walker 'Positif' pipe organ (Model C - 2 manual and pedal) has been ordered price £1585. Application has been made for a Faculty, for its installation under the arch between the chancel and the priest's vestry. This is a far more suitable position than that of the present organ, not only for sound, but for communication between the organist and the choir, altar and congregation. The removal of the present hefty and old-fashioned instrument will also open up the transept (one of the oldest parts of the church, for the last 14 years completely blocked by the organ), and provide much-needed seating accommodation.

All being well, the new organ should be installed in time for dedication by Bishop Stuart on Monday evening, 18th July, at 7-30 p.m. The service of dedication will be followed by a short organ recital by Mr. Henry King, our former organist and choirmaster.

We still need another £300 for the last lap of the organ fund appeal, and for this we draw your immediate attention to the next item, which is
