THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

Twice a year some three or four of us from Badsey and Wickhamford sit for a day in the ancient hall of the King's School, Worcester (which used to be the Abbey Refectory). We are not there just to admire the proportions of the building or the defaced stone figure of Christ in Majesty. We are taking part in the Diocesan Conference.

Some parts of the meetings are rather dull—concerned with facts and figures and reports. Sometimes they are very inspiring, as when, at the last Conference, we were privileged to hear Bishop Bayne, the recently appointed Executive Officer for the Anglican Communion. One item in every Conference is invariably stimulating. That is the Bishop's presidential address.

I always wish every member of the Church in our Diocese could hear it. Our parochial representatives (Mrs. G. H. Stewart for Badsey and Mrs. Cooke for Wickhamford) give excellent reports to the P.C.Cs., but because of the time available these have to be very short summaries. Fortunately at the last Conference the Bishop had his address printed. So in this number of the Review and the next I am going to give you some extracts from the Bishop's address instead of a message of my own. Among other things, the Bishop said:—

"The first thing I want to do is to plead for a greater charity in our diocesan and parochial life. I do not for one moment mean to imply that the Diocese or the parishes are riddled with discord and dissension. That is certainly not the case.

"...I have noticed, however, in some quarters a kind of "They" and "We" attitude, "They" being the Diocese, "those people in Worcester," and "We" the parish, which has constantly to be on its guard, lest its rights are whittled away by a persecuting prelate and his minions. The result is that often ideas which emanate from the centre are looked on with suspicion when they reach the circumference, and instead of advance, "those people in Worcester" (again thought of in inverted commas) must be kept in their place, and what might have been a pilgrim's progress has deteriorated into a pilgrim's regress.

"...Let us, all of us, get this firmly into our heads—the Diocese exists largely to help the parishes. The Bishop and the Assistant Bishop are friends and fathers. We are a family, a unit, not just separate congregations working for the good of each other. And this is what the New Testament means by Charity—See how these Christians love one another!

"...First and foremost there is the whole business of Christian Stewardship, which we are thinking of in terms of a spiritual advance programme. By Stewardship we mean that we believe our time and our talents and our money are held by us in trust from God, to be used in His service. In that sense each one of us is a priest, for a priest is essentially the servant or steward of God, and it is certainly true to say that a congregation without a sense of of this sort of stewardship has within itself the seeds of decay; most probably it is in fact spiritually already dying if not dead. But no stewardship will be successful unless the parish is pulling together and all the parishes pulling with the Diocese. It is a clear case of all of us being in charity and harmony with each other, what the marriage service describes as 'the mutual society, help and comfort that the one ought to have the other, both in prosperity and adversity'."

Next month's extracts concern stewardship in practice.

The Organ

"I congratulate the people of Badsey", said Bishop Stuart when he came to dedicate the organ on July 18th, "on this achievement, for which you have worked so many years. I am now going to set you a new target, which may seem at first sight as impossible as did the idea of raising all this money for a new organ. The new target I set you is to see that every seat in this church is filled, not just on special occasions, but every Sunday".

The dedication service was indeed an occasion of great rejoicing, as shown by all in the vigorous singing of the final hymn, "O praise ye the Lord". We are grateful to Mr. Henry King for opening the new organ with a recital after the dedication service. Messrs. J. W. Walker & Sons did a fine job in dismantling and removing the old organ and installing the new one in about ten days, causing us the minimum of inconvenience; Mrs. Marshall and the choir managed gallantly with a piano for two Sundays. Thanks are due also to the band of ladies who helped to get the church clean after the work was finished.

The Walker 'Positif' Organ is certainly a wonderful instrument for its size It is just the thing we have been needing for our small church.

What a joy it is too, to have the north transept opened up! It gives more spaciousness and light to the church. The 18th century monuments which have been hidden all this time are very interesting. Opinion is divided on the north window, designed in the eighteen-fifties. On the whole those of us who were born in the 20th century like it a great deal better than the late 19th century east window. The transept window has strong translucent colours which do not obscure the light, and a bold design allowing the use of larger pieces of glass and not too many lead cames. The late Victorians used dirty colours and they painted the glass too heavily in the attempt to be naturalistic. The children just love the transept window. This is not unexpected, for children on the whole like clean bright colours.

The Choir Outing. Thanks to the kindness of the P.C.C. and the generosity of individual donors, the choir had a most wonderful outing to Aberystwyth on July 9th. Our choir secretary, Mr. George Crisp, had as usual made careful arrangements so that everything went smoothly and happily. The drive through the mountains of Radnor and Cardigan was superb. Aberystwyth, in spite of warnings to the contrary, seemed to have enough amusements to offer, and we had an excellent lunch and tea. We started at 7 a.m., and got back at 10 p.m. (very reasonably early, considering the distance and the extra load of large sticks of rock). After our day of brilliant sunshine, we found on return that they had had it wet in Badsey. After the strain on the vocal cords on the journey home, it always seems a miracle that anyone can sing the next day, but on Sunday morning the choir were all in their places, singing praises to the Lord.

Mother's Union. Wickhamford members joined Badsey for an outing by coach to Winchester on July 12th. We arrived in time for lunch, after which we met at the West Door of the Cathedral for a conducted tour of the wonderful building, which was described by one of the vergers. This was concluded by a pilgrimage to the grave of Mary Sumner and her husband, where we said the Mother's Union Prayer. Other places of interest were visited, including the College, and after tea together we met on the coach for the drive home through some lovely scenery.
