THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

"Your Holiness, we are making history". No doubt these words will themselves appear in future history books. They were spoken by Geoffrey, Archbishop of Canterbury, as he was greeted at the Vatican by Pope John XXIV.

As we enter upon the annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (Jan. 18th to 25th), we shall all be greatly heartened this year by some very hopeful signs.

So often our prayers for unity seem powerless. It is always so when we start to think of the obstacles in the way, rather than of the love which unites the three Divine Persons in one Holy Trinity, and which is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Spirit.

Surely the great courage and faith displayed by the Archbishop in taking the initiative, and disregarding the hardened conventions of many centuries, were an answer to the prayers of faithful Christians who really care for unity. "God moves in a mysterious way, His wonders to perform", and no one can tell exactly in what manner the prayer of faith will be answered. Here is evidence that the prayers for unity have been far from fruitless.

Only those who want to retain our unhappy divisions can find fault with what the Archbishop has done.

We must not, of course, attach too much importance to the Primate's tour. These were no more than courtesy visits. But courtesy between Christian leaders is worth more than many paper schemes for reunion, which often arouse more controversy than concord.

What has come about, I think, is a complete change of climate: a current of warm air is thawing away the frozen positions which have been held for too long. That is a very necessary beginning before any real progress can be made towards reunion.

A measure of unity between the Church of England and the Protestant bodies which have dissented from her since the Reformation—though a desirable thing in itself—would by itself only widen the breach between our national Church and the rest of Catholic and Orthodox Christendom. The Archbishop's action has enabled the whole movement for reunion to be seen in a wider context. Our Church, being both Catholic and Reformed, has often been likened to a bridge, by which these two traditions in Christendom may be brought to join hands in fellowship. If that be indeed God's will for us, we must welcome these contacts between the titular head of the Anglican Communion and those of Western Catholicism and Eastern Orthodoxy. Significantly, His Grace began his pilgrimage at Jerusalem, "which is the mother of us all."

The whole of Christendom faces the need for unity against the dangers which threaten it. There is not only the resurgence of ancient Eastern faiths like Islam and Buddhism, but the phenomenal growth in Asia and Africa of hundreds of revivalist sects which have little relation to the traditional teachings of Christianity, and often proclaim a militant nationalism.

The Week of Prayer for Unity is at present the one Christian activity in which members of all denominations join—Roman Catholics, Orthodox, Lutherans, as well as Anglicans and Free Churchmen. Hence the need for us all to support it and take part in it.

Here is a prayer for you to use during those eight days (Jan. 18th to 25th):—

O Lord Jesus Christ, who didst pray for thy disciples that they might be one, even as thou art one with the Father, draw us to thyself, that in common love and obedience we may be united to one another in the fellowship of the one Spirit, that the world may believe that thou art Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Amen.

May the peace of God dwell in your hearts all through this Year.

The World-wide Church. It is a matter for thankfulness that, in spite of heavy parochial commitments this year, this church has again increased its giving for the Church overseas. Once more the biggest improvement has been in the amount given through missionary boxes. This has risen in four years from £15-10-0 to £46-7-3. This year the increase in boxes offset the drop in church collections from £42-7-1 to £33-12-5, mainly due to the fact that we had only two Sunday collections in 1960, though collections in Holy Week and Ascension Day were good. The total of £80 was divided as follows: £50 to S.P.G., £10 each to C.M.S., S.P.C.K., B. & F.B.S. In addition there was £7-6-6 collected at our mid-week meetings in Lent for the Mauritius Church Aid Fund (after the disastrous cyclone there), bringing the total of overseas giving for 1960 to over £87. Add to that £12 contributed by the Sunday School to pay the fees of a child at a mission school in Bihar, India, and £2-4-0 given by the M.U. to their overseas fund, and we get a grand total of just over £100.

Miss N. E. Smith, Pool House, has some more missionary boxes available for families who do not possess one. It is a very good way of giving regularly, and encouraging children to do so, to have such a box in your home, and trying to put in a definite amount each week.

Miss Smith will also gladly take orders for Overseas News (2/- a year), also the Quarterly Intercession Paper. Orders may be given to the Vicar for the arresting booklet published by the Overseas Council of the Church Assembly entitled "God's World" (2/-). This little book has very informative pictures and diagrams, and presents some startling facts about the world in which we live. All churchpeople ought to read it.

Moral Welfare: the People's Offering. The house-to-house collection brought in £24, an increase of nearly £5 on the last collection.

Congratulations to all collectors and donors. It needs faith and courage to go round collecting for this cause, about which there is a certain amount of misunderstanding, and sometimes prejudice. So we may rejoice in the successful result, for it is a work very dear to the heart of Our Lord.

It was emphasised that the object of the campaign was not to raise money but to introduce youth to something which is often considered the business of old fogeys. We found during the conference an 'excellent opportunity to meet other young people and compare ideas about the Church in the parish. Future meetings will include a question time when the Bishop of Worcester will answer any questions which are foremost in any young person's mind. There are no commitments or subscriptions and it is hoped that any other young people interested will go along to future meetings.
