THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

The news of Dr. Fisher's resignation has come as a bit of a shock, as he is, on his own admission, in full vigour, in spite of his 74 years. No one however will begrudge him his retirement, for the burden of office of a 20th century Primate of All-England must be well-nigh intolerable. We must thank God that Geoffrey Fisher has been endowed with a robust constitution to carry him through the job which laid low his predecessor in his prime. For there is no doubt that his primacy has been one of the most significant and constructive in the history of the Anglican Communion.

I was ordained to the priesthood by Dr. Fisher, who had just succeeded Dr. Winnington Ingram as Bishop of London during my diaconate. At that same ordination service in St. Paul's Cathedral, the preacher was a brilliant young Cambridge incumbent and lecturer, the Rev. Michael Ramsey, who also conducted the ordinands' retreat. I shall always be grateful for the words of wisdom and inspiration from these two men.

I have very happy personal memories of Dr. Fisher. Though he could be stern, it was his genial friendliness which most impressed us and won our hearts. He has a wonderful memory for people; yet at his first meetings with Parochial Church Councillors on coming to the Diocese, he safeguarded himself by saying: "Don't be offended if I can't remember your name next time I meet you. It's only if a person has something peculiar about him that I remember his name!"

We must all pray for Dr. Ramsey, and for Dr. Coggan, who is to succeed him at York. I once heard a very helpful series of devotional talks in church by Dr. Coggan on the Epistle to the Ephesians. It is a pity that the Press has labelled these two as High and Low Church respectively, for the days are past when this sort of thing really mattered (if it ever did. In any case, both men are zealons for unity between Christians, and we may be confident that the great work which Dr. Fisher has done so much to promote will go even further in their hands.

Annual Church Meetings. You can skip this part of my letter if you don't really care about the life of the Church to which you belong.

On the other hand, if the Kingdom of God matters to you a lot, you will note this and act upon it.

The Annual Parochial Church Meetings of our parishes will be held as follows: Wickhamford, Wed., Feb. 8th, at 7-30 p.m. in the Memorial Hall; Badsey & Aldington, Tues., Feb. 21st, at 7-15 p.m. in the Parish Room.

The Bishop, when he spoke at Evesham in Dec. said there was no need for these meetings to be dull. But I do not think anyone who has been to the Badsey or Wickhamford meetings has complained of boredom! All sorts of unexpected things

happen. If you stay away, and a revolution takes place in the affairs of your parish, don't complain that you were not consulted. Nominations for the elections may be made on the list in the church porch.

know your Bible. The revised translation of the New Testament, on which many scholars have been at work for several years, will be published in March. This will be the first authorised version to be published in 20th century English. The popular edition will sell at only 8/6. It is hoped that this great event will stimulate the study of the Bible throughout the country. In both churches my Sunday evening course of sermons from Septuagesima (Jan. 29th) to Palm Sunday will be on the message of the Bible as a whole. Too often our study of the Bible is piecemeal and scrappy. I shall try to present it as a continuous drama in about eight episodes.

Progress in Prayer. Another need we all have is to learn to pray better. We can never know enough about prayer. Some adult Christians never advance beyond the childhood prayers they learnt at mother's knee. On Wednesday evenings in Lent, in Badsey Church at 7-15 p.m., we shall have a devotional service, with a practical course on Prayer. Notebooks and pencils are recommended. I hope too that people will not be afraid to ask questions and bring up problems about prayer on which they would like guidance and help. The year be written down and handed in if you like. Wickhamford people will be welcome to this course.

The children's Lent Services will be on Wednesdays at 4-15 p.m. Each child will be given a card, with a stamp for each service he attends.

An Invitation.

"Come along to some quiet place by yourselves, and rest for a little while".

An invitation from the Master Himself to His disciples is not lightly to be declined. When there is incessant coming and going in our lives we need more than ever to re-charge the spiritual batteries. What would you not give for a whole afternoon spent with Our Lord and His disciples, quietly listening to Him?

Here then is your opportunity. On Saturday, 18th March, a Quiet Afternoon has been arranged for people of Evesham Rural Deanery, similar to the one we had last Lent at Harvington. This year it is to be at Badsey Church, from 3-0 to 6-0. Keep the date free.

An Evesham Enterprise.

The parishes of Evesham Deanery are joining forces in an attempt to bring the Church into the market-place, and spread the knowledge of God by means of Christian literature.

Badsey and Wickhamford Parochial Church Councils have already agreed in principle to support the venture of running a religious bookstall in Evesham Market Square on Saturdays. A book agent's licence has been obtained, and the stall is to be opened by the Bishop of Worcester on Saturday, 8th April. The bookstall will be staffed by clergy and lavpeople from the parishes of the Deanery in turn. We want our parishes to play their full part, and the Vicar will be glad to have the names of any who would like to help for a few hours on one or two Saturday mornings or afternoons during the spring and summer.

We feel that by this enterprise the Church can show the people of the Vale and its many visitors that she really wants to share with them the priceless Treasure which she has in Christ.

Will you join the team?

We are grateful for all the work he has done with the choir.

Both the Senior Residents' Party and the Sunday School Party early in January were much enjoyed by those who took part. The catering for the former was as usual splendidly done by Mr. E. L. Mustoe and his helpers, and our thanks are due to all the kind donors and to those who freely gave of their talent and time to entertain the assembled company. I wish to thank the ladies who catered for the Sunday School party, and to acknowledge the generous donations in money and in kind.
